I. Counting planar maps: the early days William Tutte and the recursive method







This increases the outer degree! (by 2)



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OK... then count near-quadrangulations, and record the outer degree: q(n, d) near-quadrangulations with n inner faces and outer degree d



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q(n, d) near-quadrangulations with n inner faces and outer degree dRecurrence relation: q(0, 0) = 1 and

$$q(n,d) = \sum_{n_1+n_2=n} \sum_{d_1+d_2=d-2} q(n_1,d_1)q(n_2,d_2) + q(n-1,d+2)$$



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Generating function: $Q(t,x) = \sum_{n,d \ge 0} q(n,d) t^n x^d$ $Q(t,x) = 1 + x^2 Q(t,x)^2 + \frac{t}{x^2} \left(Q(t,x) - 1 - x^2 Q_2(t) \right),$

with

$$Q_2(t) = [x^2]Q(t,x) = \sum_{n\geq 0} q(n,2)t^n.$$

Functional equation:

$$Q(t,x) = 1 + x^2 Q(t,x)^2 + \frac{t}{x^2} \left(Q(t,x) - 1 - x^2 Q_2(t)\right),$$

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The original solution: guess and check

$$Q_2(t) = rac{(1-12t)^{3/2}-1+18t}{54t^2}$$
 and $q(n,2) = 2\cdot 3^n rac{(2n)!}{n!(n+2)!}.$

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This is also the number of quadrangulations with n faces.

- One may have to

- Solving can be non-trivial!

The number of planar Eulerian orientations

Theorem [mbm & Elvey Price 18] Let $S \equiv S(t) = t - 2t^2 - 4t^3 - 20t^4 - 132t^5 - \cdots$ be the unique power series with constant term 0 satisfying

$$t = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n}{n}^2 \mathsf{S}^{n+1}.$$

The generating function of planar Eulerian orientations counted by edges is

$$G(t) = \frac{1}{4t^2}(t - 2t^2 - S(t))$$

= $t + 5t^2 + 33t^3 + \cdots$

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= $t + 5t^2 + 33t^3 + \cdots$

Asymptotics: $G(t) = \sum_{n} g_{n}t^{n}$ where

$$g_n \sim \frac{1}{16} \frac{(4\pi)^{n+2}}{n^2 (\log n)^2}$$

III. Two bijections

1. The dual of an Eulerian orientation: a labelled map

2. A bijection between 4-valent Eulerian orientations with no alternating vertex (n vertices) and general Eulerian orientations with n edges





The orientation defines a height function on the faces

[Elvey Price & Guttmann 18]





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Labelled maps are rooted planar maps with labelled vertices such that:

- the root edge is labelled from 0 to 1,
- adjacent labels differ by ± 1 .

Corollary

The number of labelled maps with n edges is half the number of colourful quadrangulations with n faces.

IV. Functional equations



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- One may have to
 - introduce more general objects (3 different classes of labelled maps)
 - introduce new enumeration parameters (2 of them)
- Solving can be non-trivial!

• There exists a unique 3-tuple of series, denoted P(t, y), C(t, x, y) and D(t, x, y), belonging to $\mathbb{Q}[[y, t]]$, $\mathbb{Q}[x][[y, t]]$ and $\mathbb{Q}[[x, y, t]]$, such that:

$$P(t, y) = \frac{1}{y} [x^{1}] C(t, x, y),$$

$$D(t, x, y) = \frac{1}{1 - C\left(t, \frac{1}{1 - x}, y\right)},$$

$$C(t, x, y) = xy [x^{\ge 0}] \left(P(t, tx) D\left(t, \frac{1}{x}, y\right)\right),$$
(t. 0) 1

and P(t, 0) = 1.

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Notation: for a Laurent series $F(x) = \sum_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} F_i x^i$,

$$[x^1]F(x) := F_1$$
 and $[x^{\ge 0}]F(x) := \sum_{i\ge 0} F_i x^i$.

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• The generating function that counts colourful quadrangulations by faces is $\mathsf{Q}^\mathsf{c}(t) = [y^1]\mathsf{P}(t,y) - 1.$

- Recall that $Q^{c}(t) = 2G(t)$, where G(t) counts Eulerian orientations by edges.

The most interesting equation

$$\mathsf{C}(t,x,y) = xy[x^{\geq 0}]\left(\mathsf{P}(t,tx)\mathsf{D}\left(t,\frac{1}{x},y\right)\right)$$

V. Solution: guess and check!



Solution for colourful quadrangulations

• Let $S \equiv S(t) = t - 2t^2 - 4t^3 - 20t^4 - 132t^5 - \cdots$ be the unique power series with constant term 0 satisfying

$$t = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n}{n}^2 \mathsf{S}^{n+1}$$

• The generating function of planar Eulerian orientations counted by edges is

$$G(t) = Q^{c}(t)/2 = \frac{1}{4t^{2}}(t - 2t^{2} - S)$$

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• The whole solution:

$$t \mathsf{P}(t, ty) = \sum_{n \ge 0} \sum_{j=0}^{n} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n}{n} \binom{2n-j}{n} y^{j} \mathsf{S}^{n+1},$$
$$\mathsf{C}(t, x, ty) = 1 - \exp\left(-\sum_{n \ge 0} \sum_{j=0}^{n} \sum_{i=0}^{n} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n-i}{n} \binom{2n-j}{n} x^{i+1} y^{j+1} \mathsf{S}^{n+1}\right)$$
$$\mathsf{D}(t, x, ty) = \exp\left(\sum_{n \ge 0} \sum_{j=0}^{n} \sum_{i \ge 0} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n-j}{n} \binom{2n+i+1}{n} x^{i} y^{j+1} \mathsf{S}^{n+1}\right)$$

A similar solution for all labelled quadrangulations

(with a more complicated system of functional equations)

• Let $R(t) \equiv R = t - 3t^2 - 12t^3 - 105t^4 - 1206t^5 - \cdots$, be the unique formal power series with constant term 0 satisfying

$$t = \sum_{n \ge 0} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n}{n} \binom{3n}{n} \mathbb{R}^{n+1}.$$

• Then the generating function of 4-valent Eulerian orientations, counted by vertices, is

$$Q(t) = \frac{1}{3t^2} (t - 3t^2 - R(t))$$

= 4t + 35t^2 + 402t^3 +

• Asymptotics:

$$q_n \sim rac{1}{18} \, rac{(4\sqrt{3}\,\pi)^{n+2}}{n^2 (\log n)^2}$$

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How can one guess that?

Let $R = t - 3t^2 + \cdots$ satisfy:

 about 100 coefficients q_n of Q(t)

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VI. The 6-vertex model

An additional weight ω on alternating vertices of 4-valent maps



Recall: solution when $\omega = 1$

Let $R(t) \equiv R = t - 3t^2 - 12t^3 - 105t^4 - 1206t^5 - \cdots$, be the unique formal power series with constant term 0 satisfying

$$t = \sum_{n \ge 0} \frac{1}{n+1} \binom{2n}{n} \binom{3n}{n} \mathbb{R}^{n+1}.$$

Then the generating function of 4-valent Eulerian orientations, counted by vertices, is

$$Q(t) = \frac{1}{3t^2} (t - 3t^2 - R(t)).$$

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where

$$\vartheta(z,q) = 2\sin(z)q^{1/8}\prod_{n=1}^{\infty}(1-2\cos(2z)q^n+q^{2n})(1-q^n).$$

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 \bullet Define the series $\mathsf{R}(t,\omega)$ by

$$\mathsf{R}(t,\omega) = \frac{\cos^2 \alpha}{96 \sin^4 \alpha} \frac{\vartheta(\alpha,q)^2}{\vartheta'(\alpha,q)^2} \left(-\frac{\vartheta'''(\alpha,q)}{\vartheta'(\alpha,q)} + \frac{\vartheta'''(0,q)}{\vartheta'(0,q)} \right).$$

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 \bullet Then the generating function of quartic rooted planar Eulerian orientations, counted by vertices, with a weight ω per alternating vertex is

$$\mathsf{Q}(t,\omega) = rac{1}{(\omega+2)t^2} \left(t-(\omega+2)t^2-\mathsf{R}(t,\omega)
ight).$$

- Relate this to the MBM-EP solution when $\omega=0$ or $\omega=1$ [Elvey Price & Zinn Justin 19+]
- \bullet Find a new proof of Kostov's result via our functional equations [mbm & Elvey Price 19+]

- record the number of faces in Eulerian orientations (equivalently, the number of oriented faces in 4-valent Eulerian orientations) done
- record the label of a vertex in a pointed labelled map in progress. Scaling and limit law?
- \bullet asymptotics and phase transitions when ω varies

Something to take home

Let
$$R = t - 3t^2 + \cdots$$
 satisfy:

$$t = \sum_{n \ge 0} \frac{1}{n+1} {\binom{2n}{n}} {\binom{3n}{n}} R^{n+1}$$

The GF of 4-valent Eulerian orientations is

$$\mathsf{Q}(t) = \frac{1}{3t^2} \left(t - 3t^2 - \mathsf{R}(t) \right).$$

Another interpretation [mbm-Courtiel 15]

Consider ternary trees with black and white leaves. Define the charge at a node to be the number of white leaves minus the number of black leaves in the associated subtree. Then (t - R)/t = 3t(1 + Q) counts (by the number of nodes) trees in which the root is the only vertex of charge 1.
