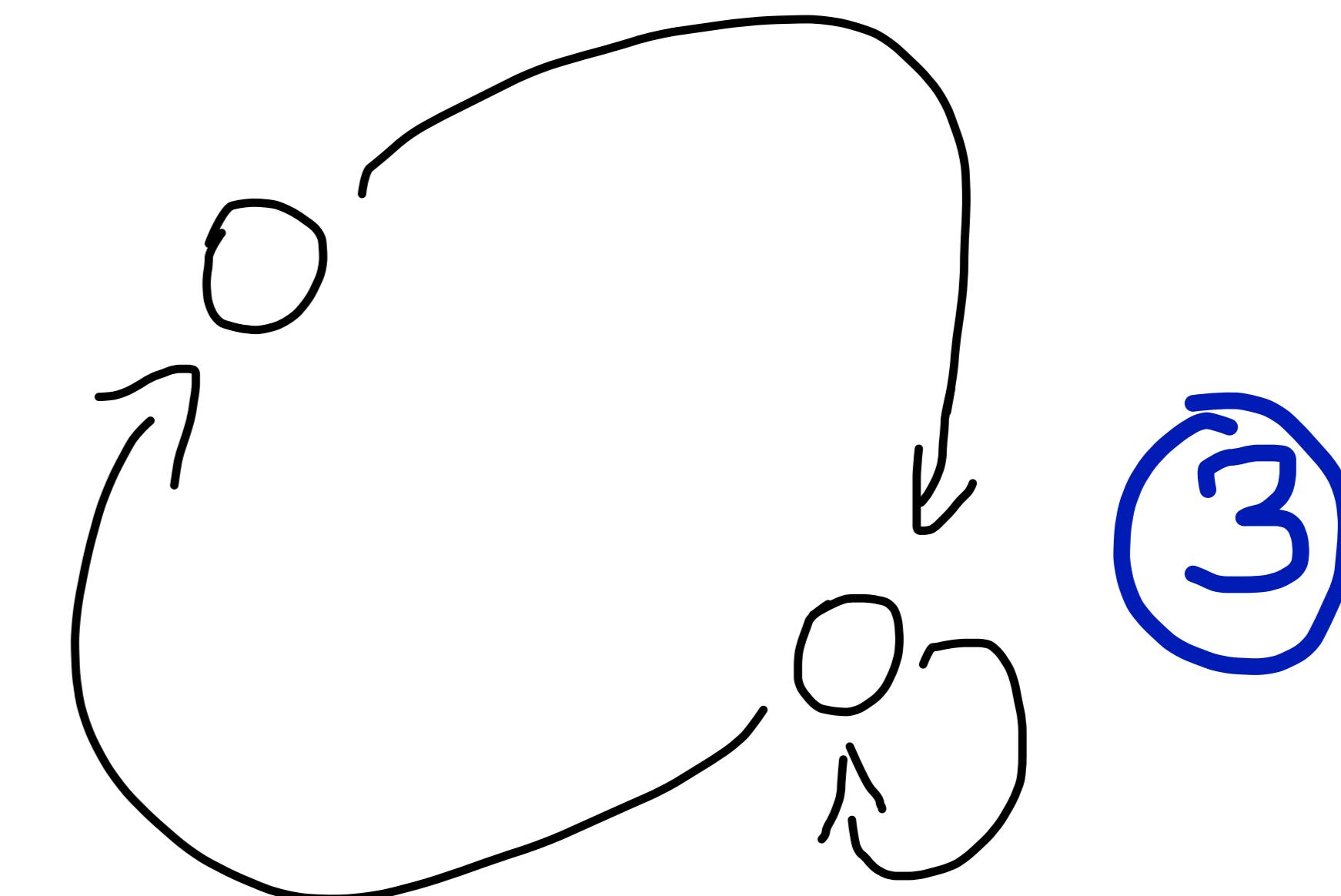
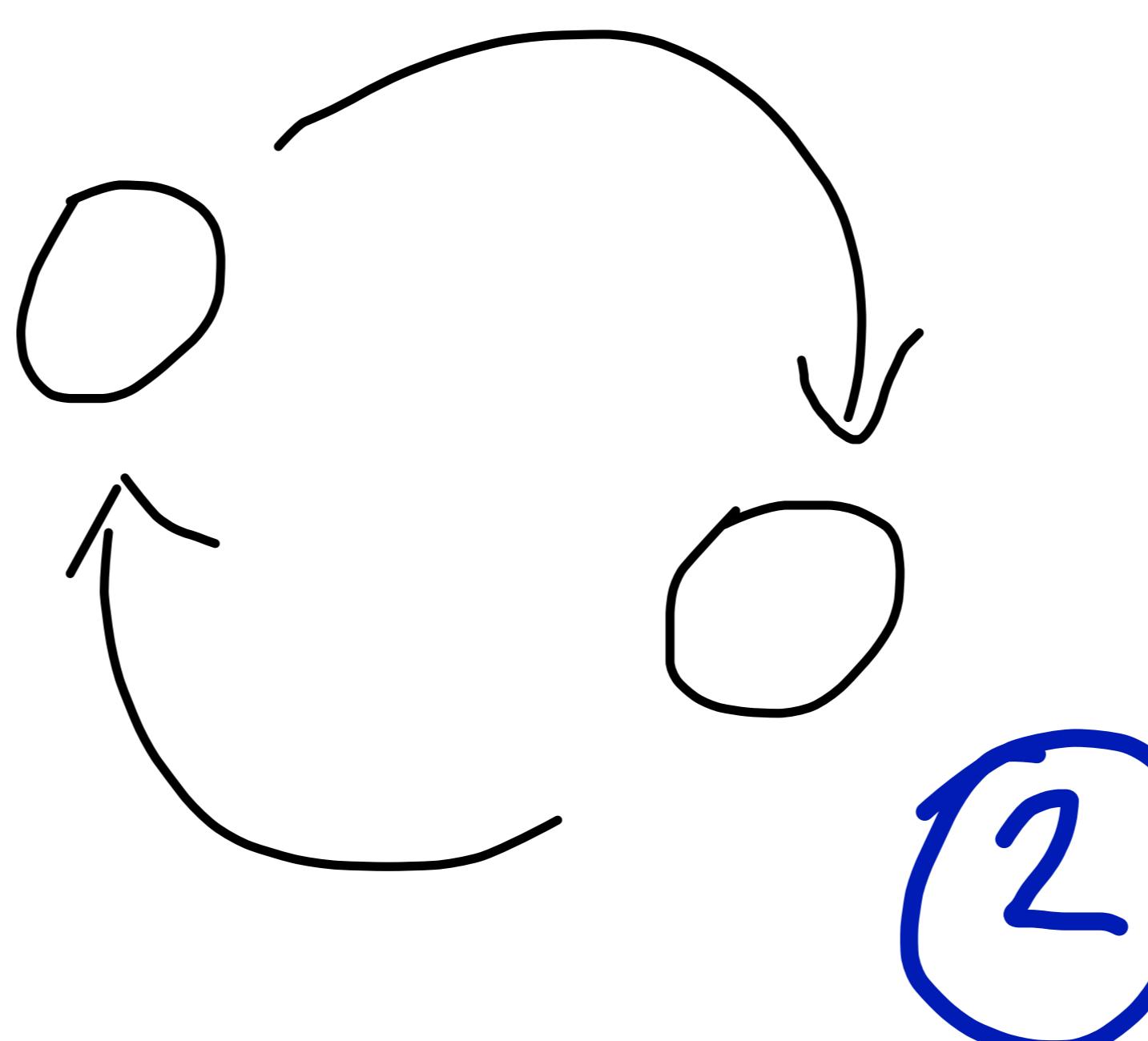
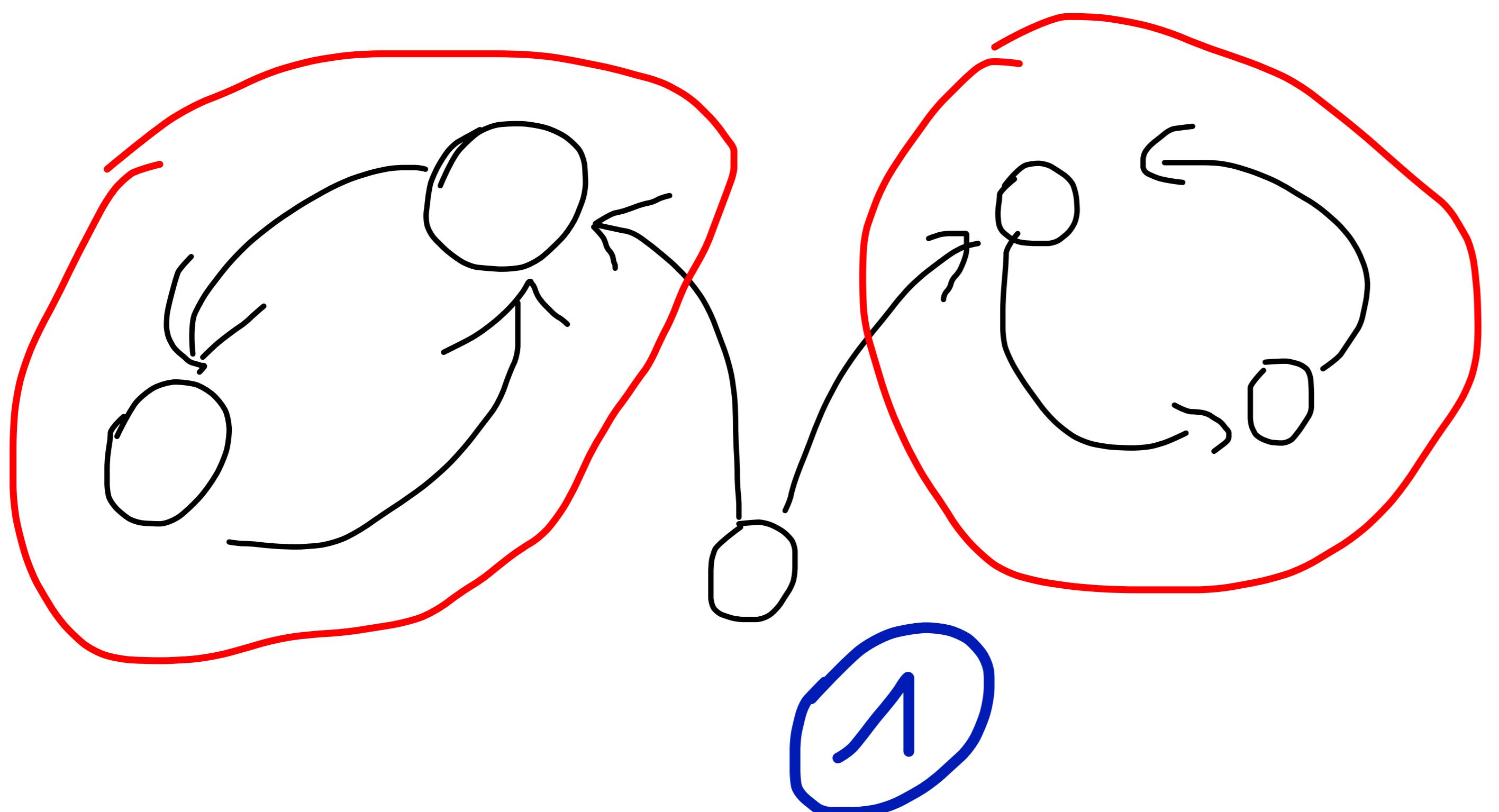
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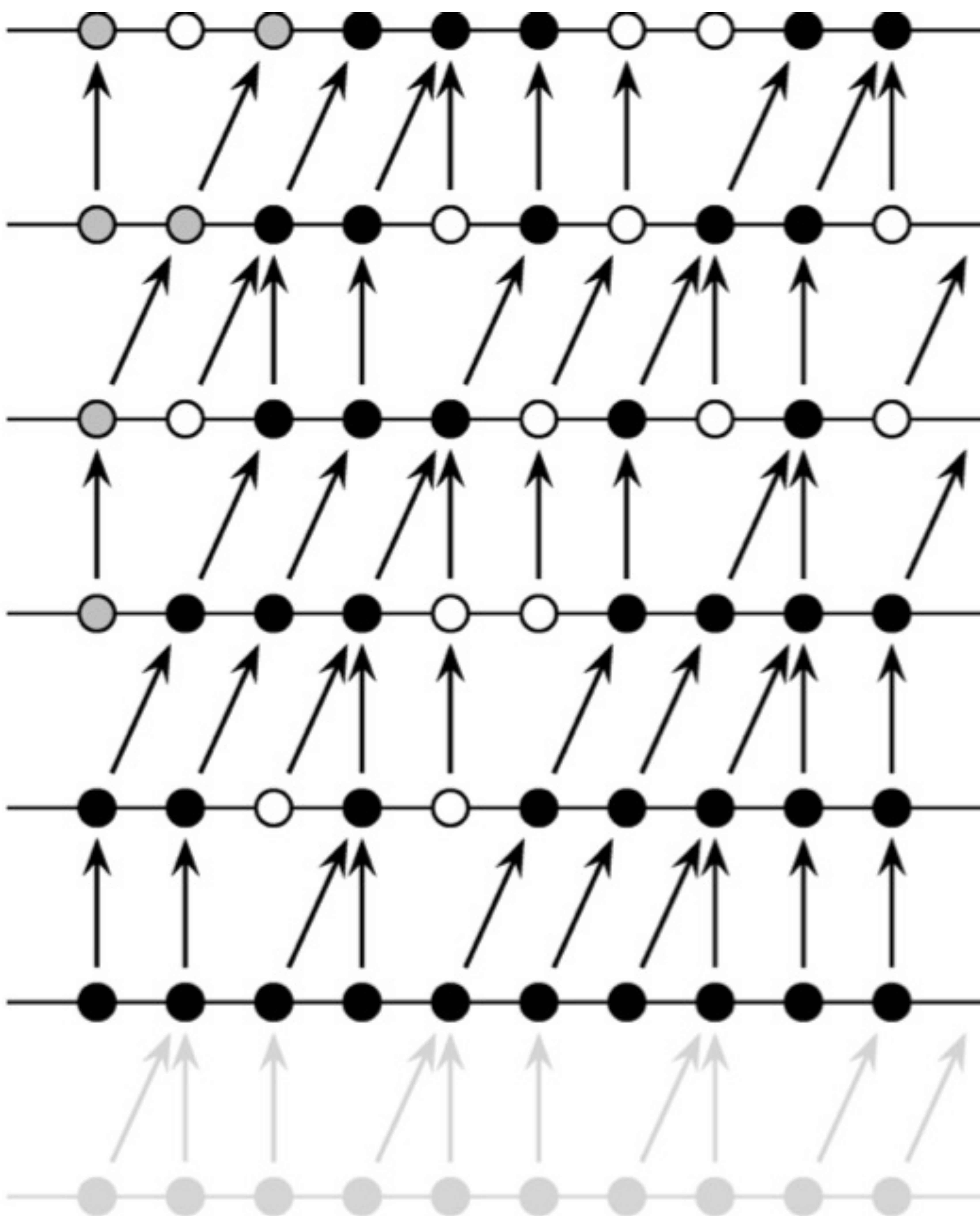
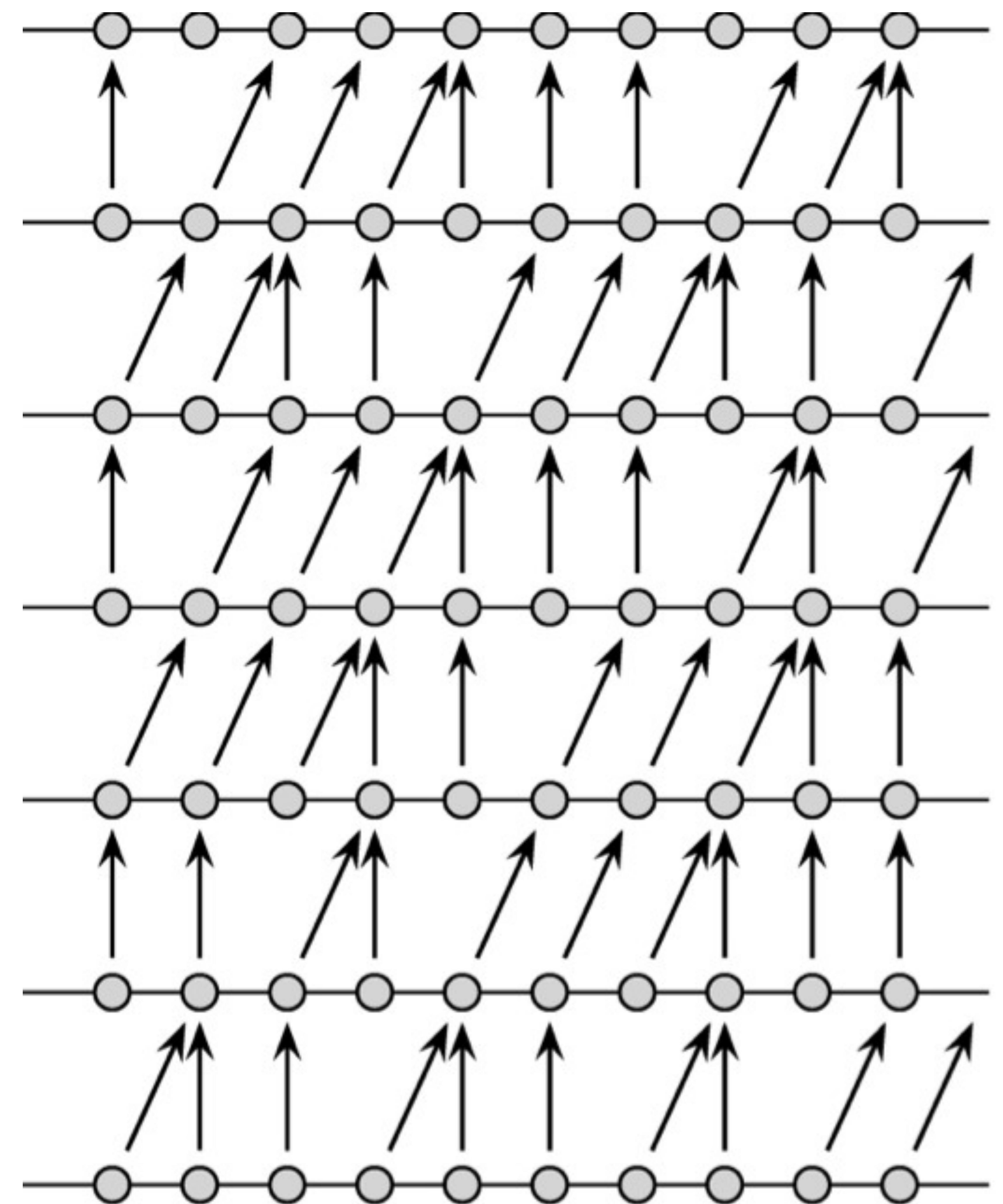
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FINITE STATE MARKOV CHAIN

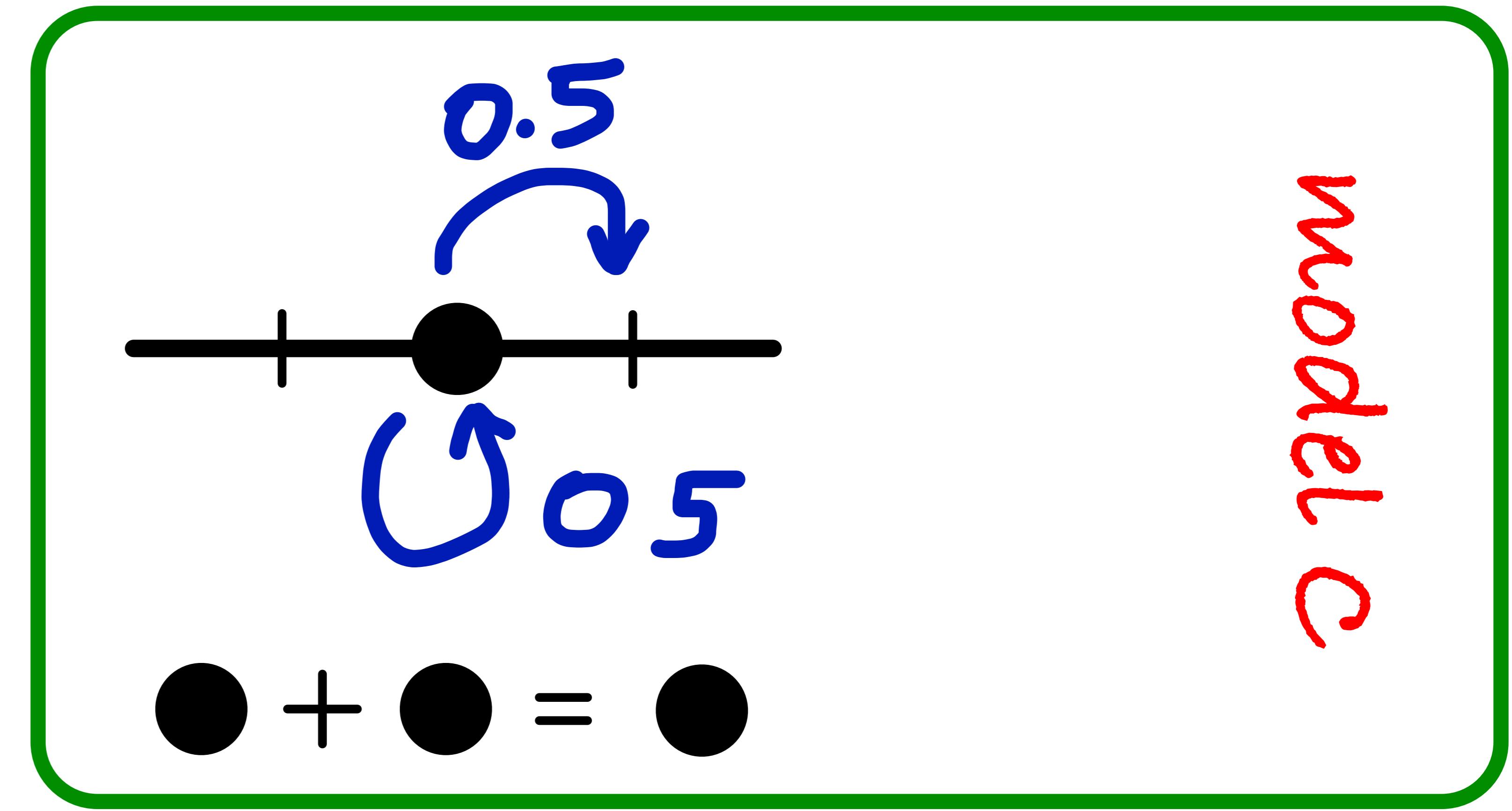
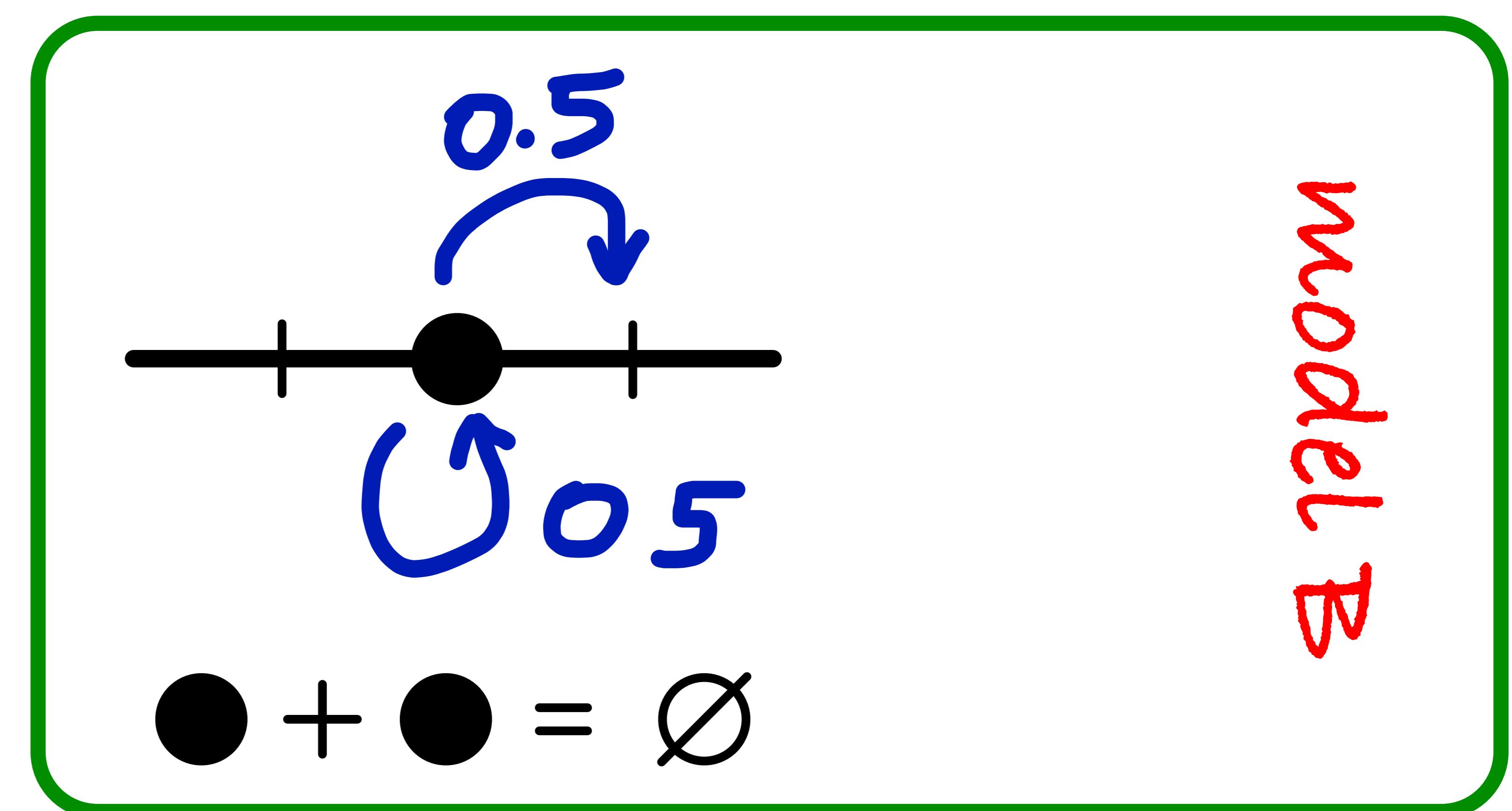
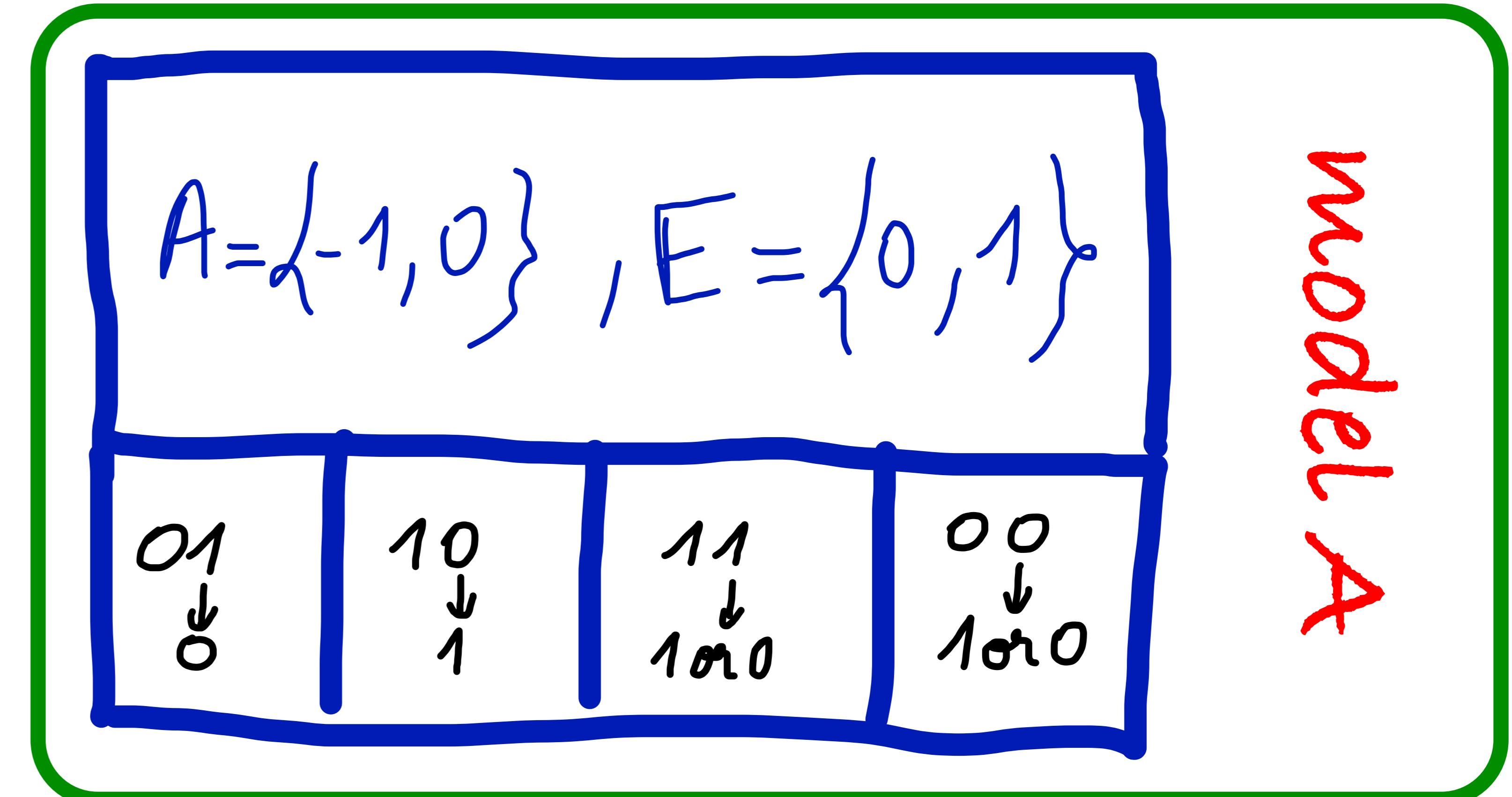


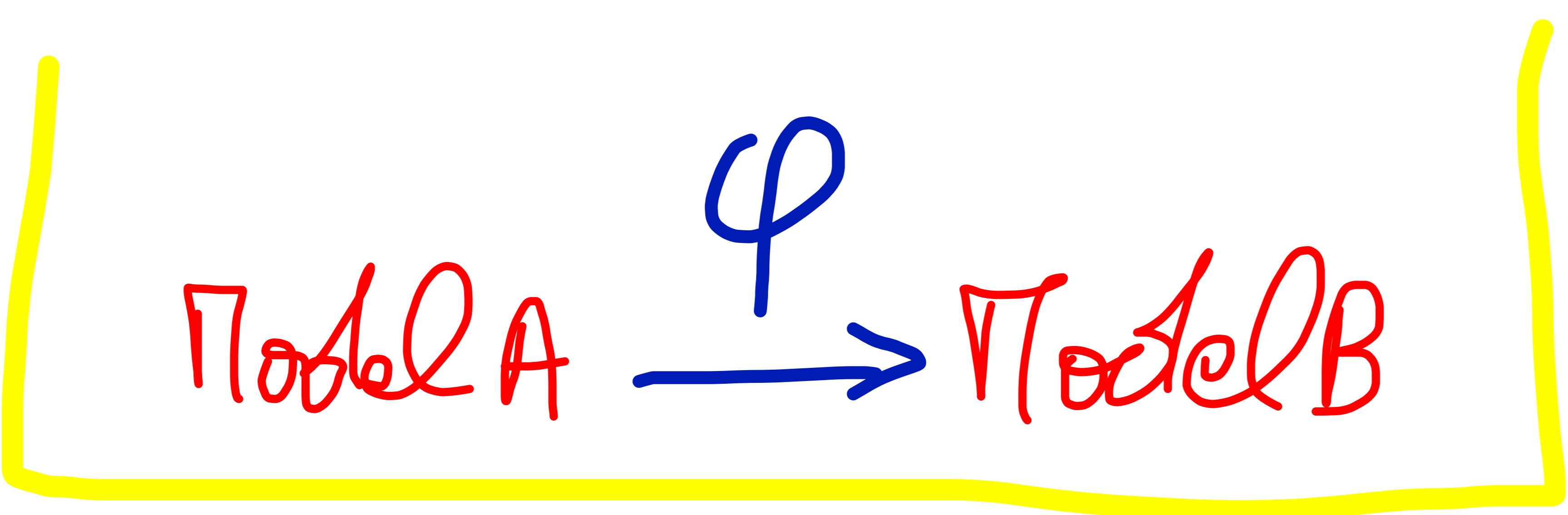
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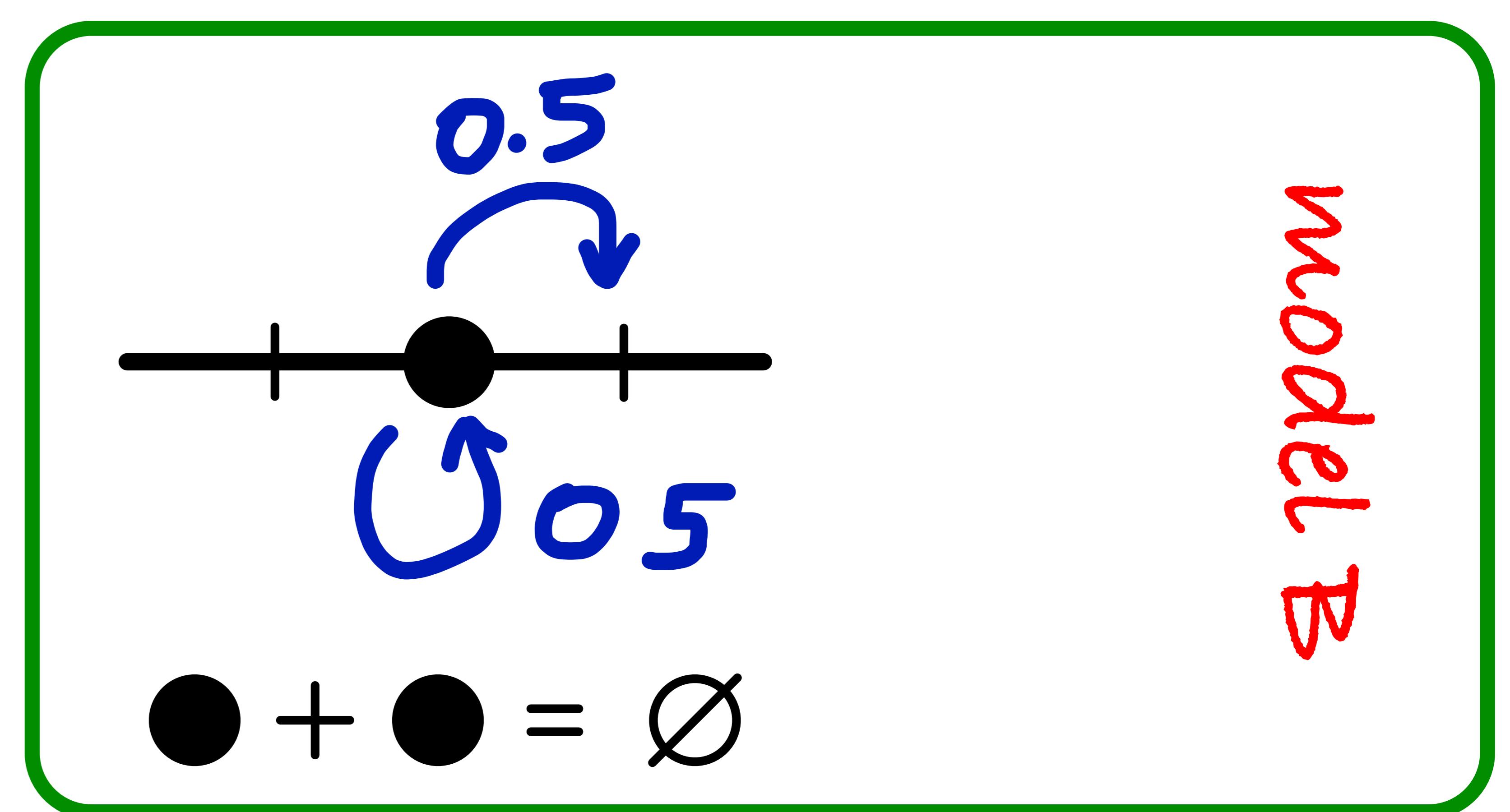
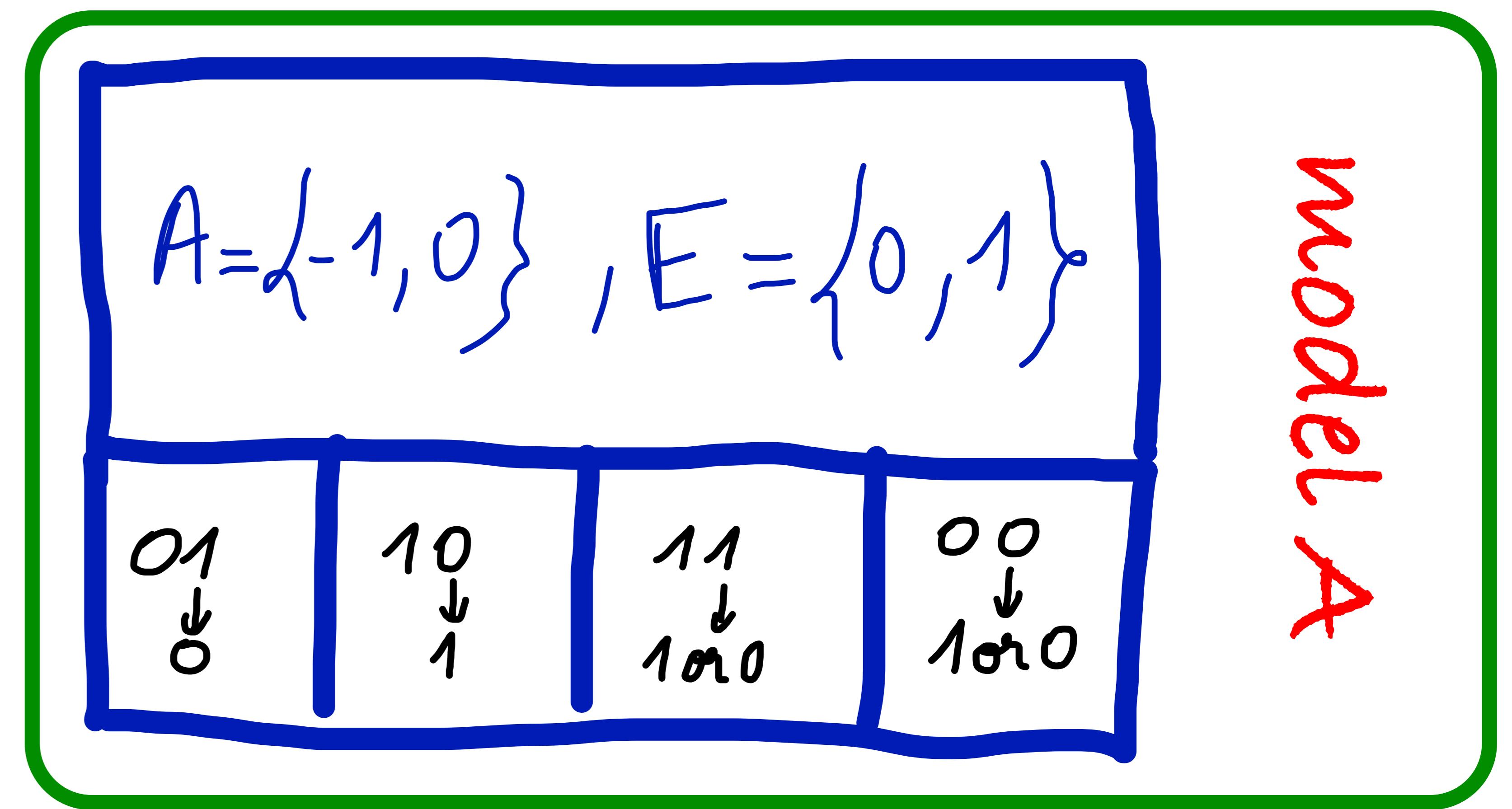


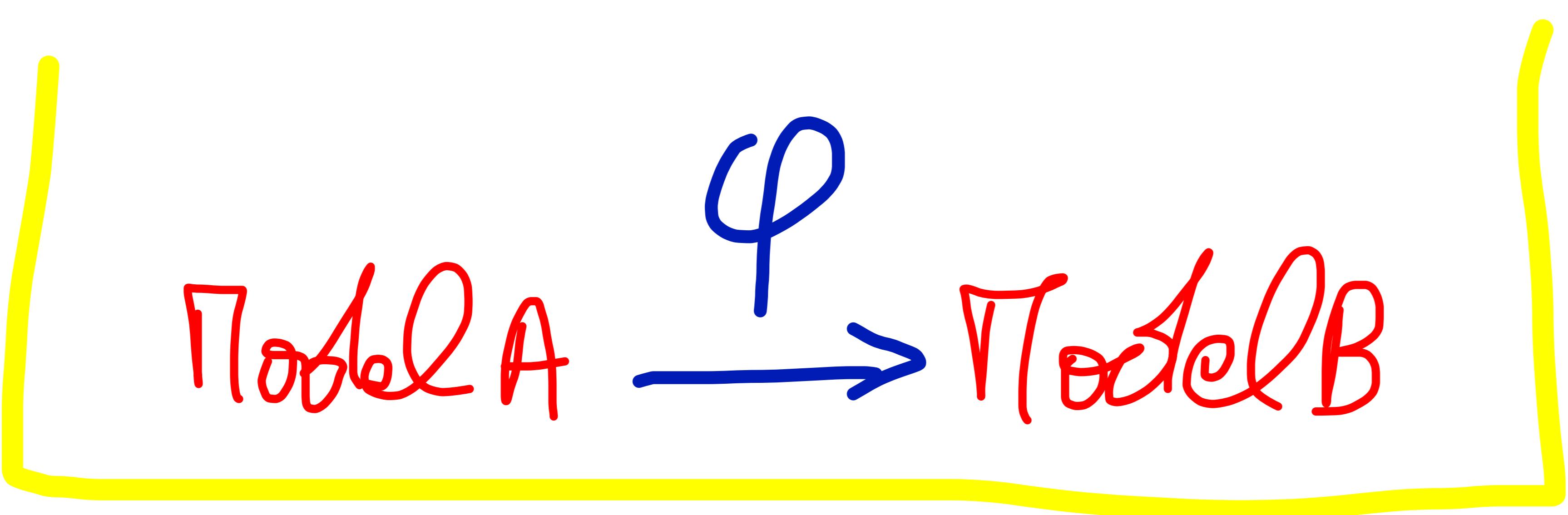


For $x \in \{0,1\}^{\mathbb{Z}}$, $\eta \in \{0,\bullet\}^{\mathbb{Z}}$, $\eta = \varphi(x)$ if:

$$\{x_i = x_{i+1}\} \iff \{\eta_i = \bullet\}$$

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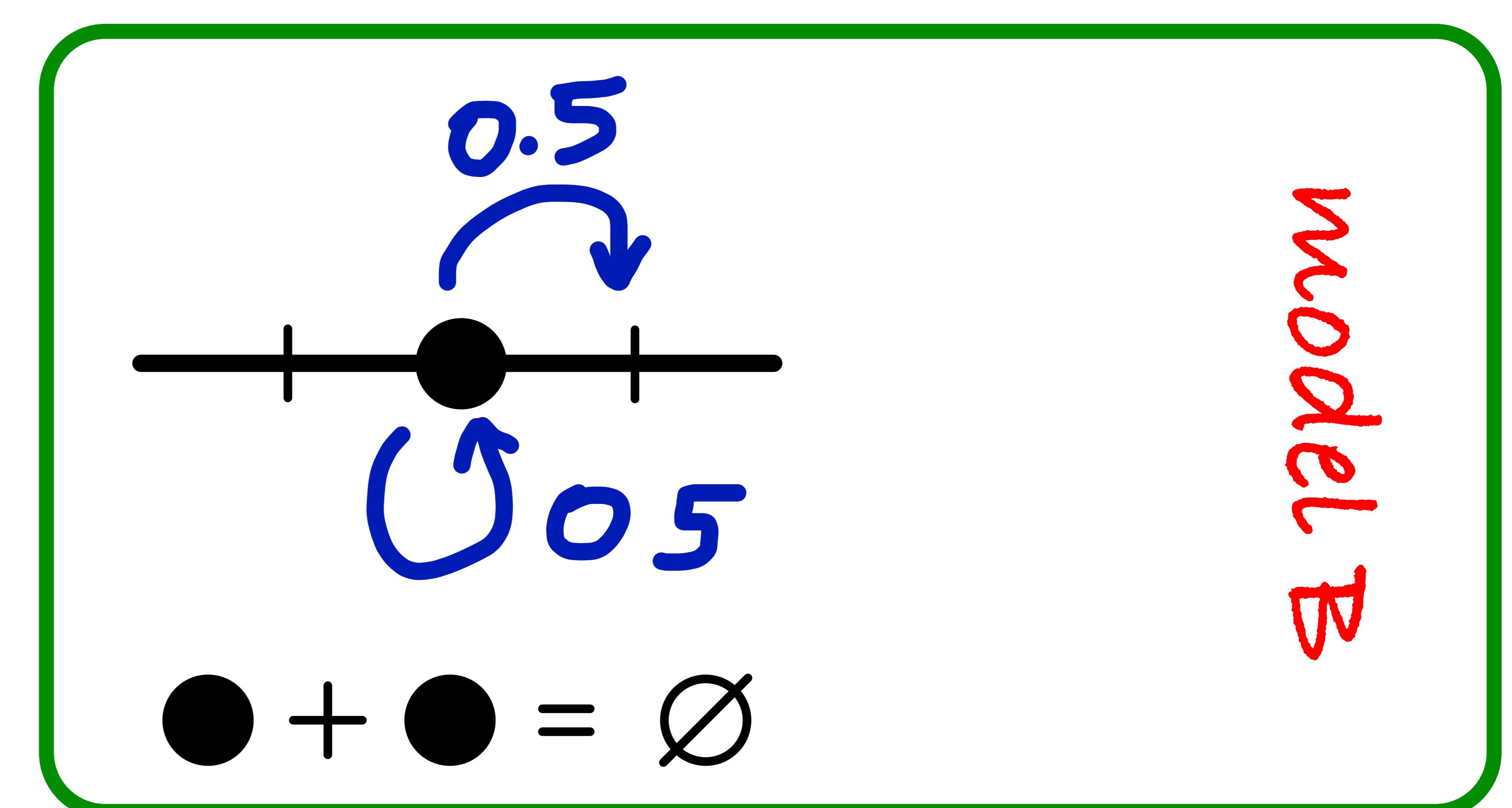
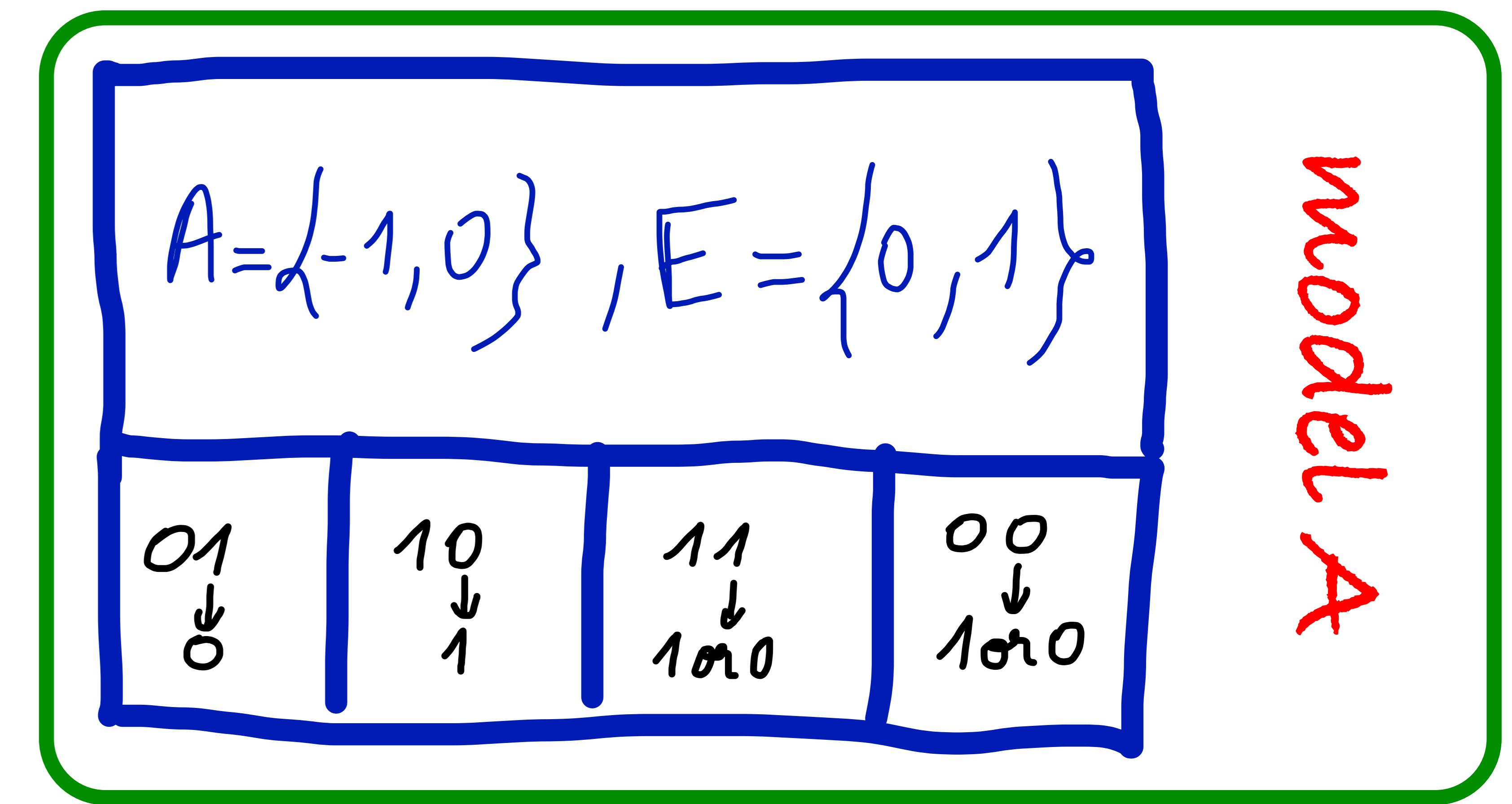

Recall that $a = (01)^\mathbb{Z}$ $b = (10)^\mathbb{Z}$ and

$$\frac{1}{2} \delta_a + \frac{1}{2} \delta_b = \mu.$$

Since .

$$\varphi(a) = \varphi(b) = \emptyset^\mathbb{Z} = 0^\mathbb{Z},$$

we have .

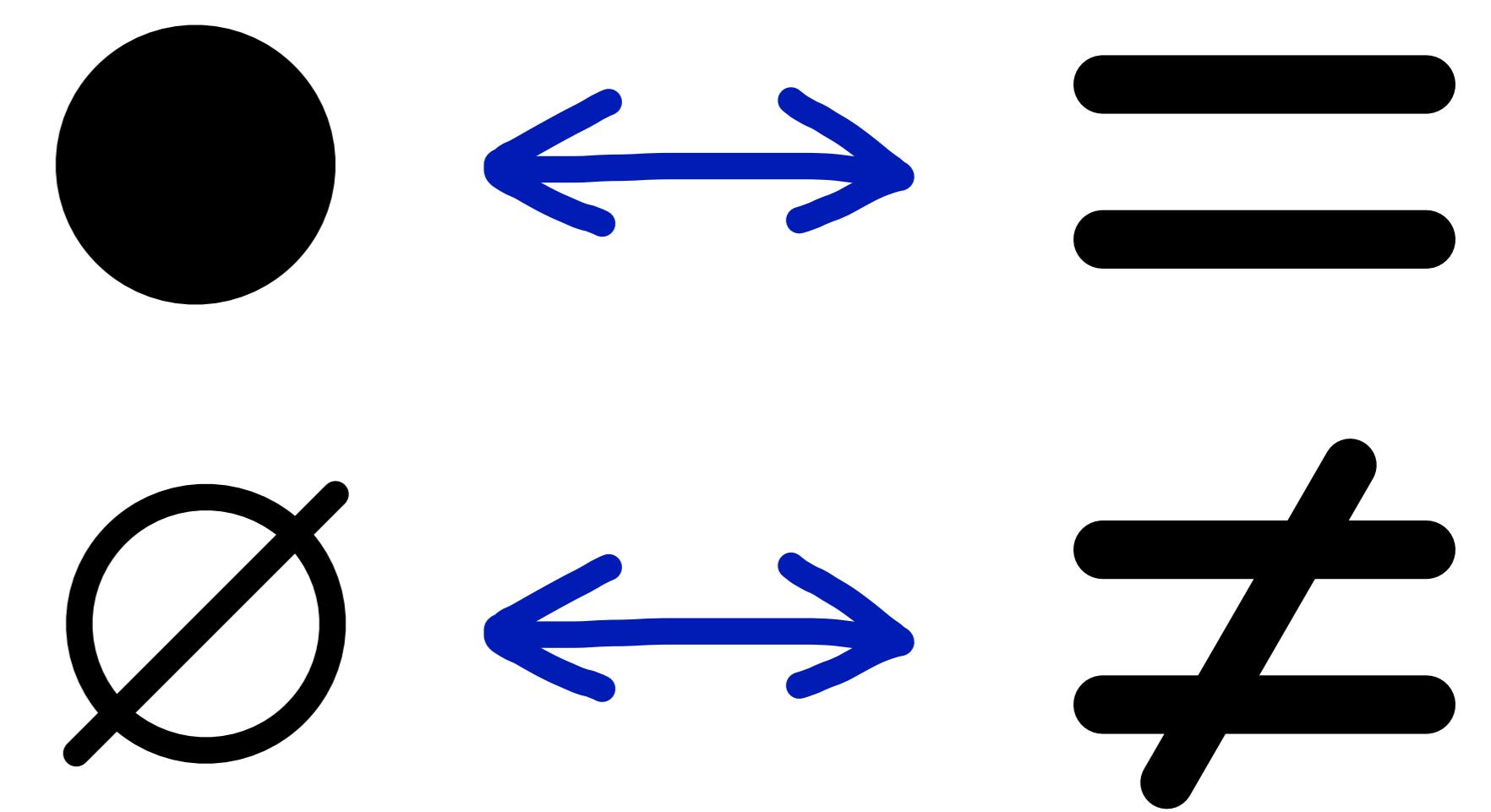
$$\boxed{\varphi(\mu) = \emptyset_{\emptyset^\mathbb{Z}}}$$

but also :

$$\boxed{\varphi(\alpha \delta_a + (1-\alpha) \delta_b) = \emptyset_{\emptyset^\mathbb{Z}}}$$

and $\alpha \delta_a + (1-\alpha) \delta_b$ are the only solutions

of $\varphi(v) = \emptyset_{\emptyset^\mathbb{Z}}$.

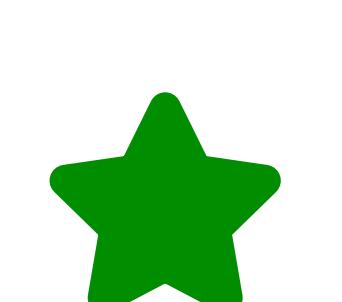




Model B is not monotone

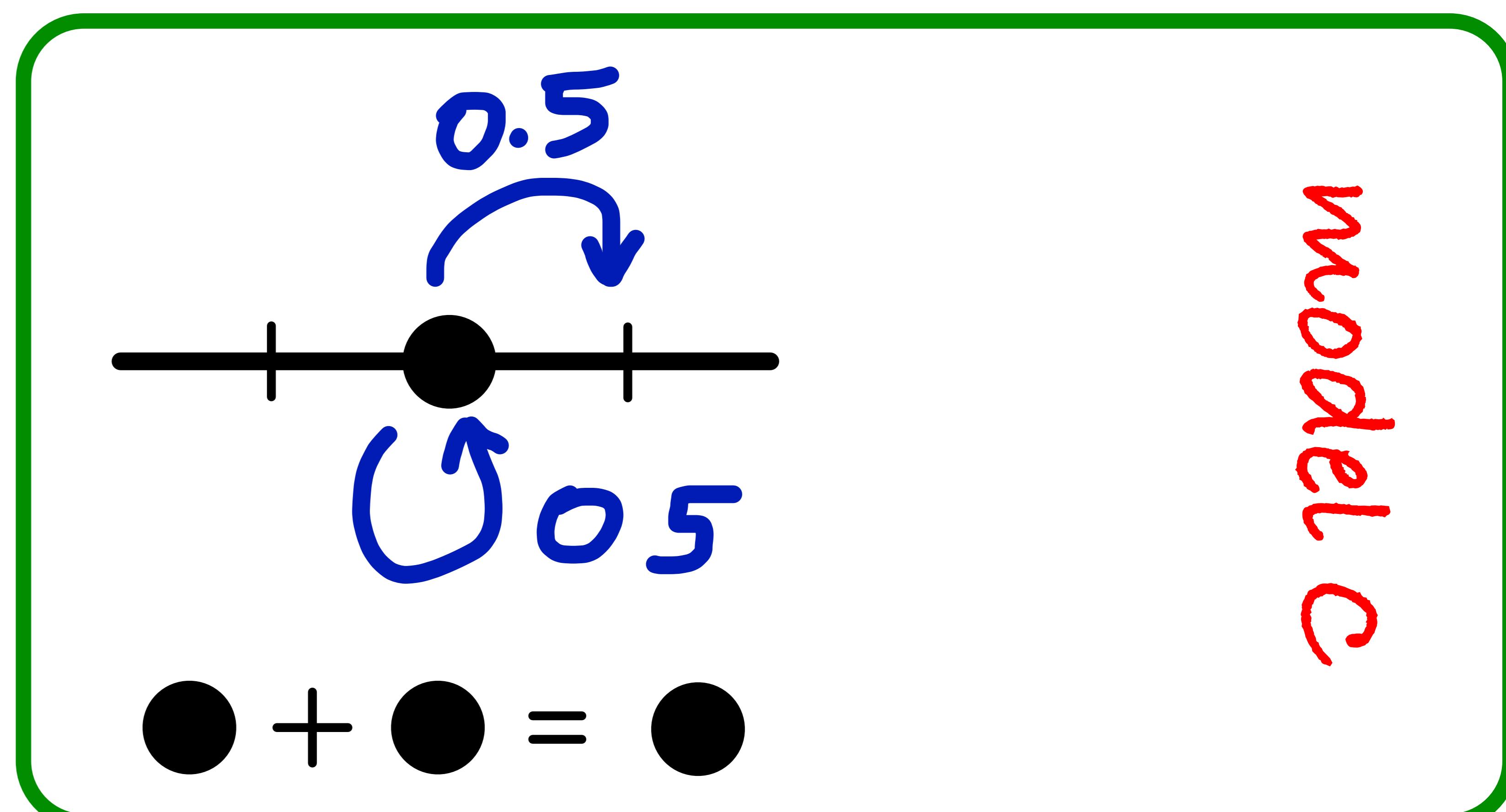
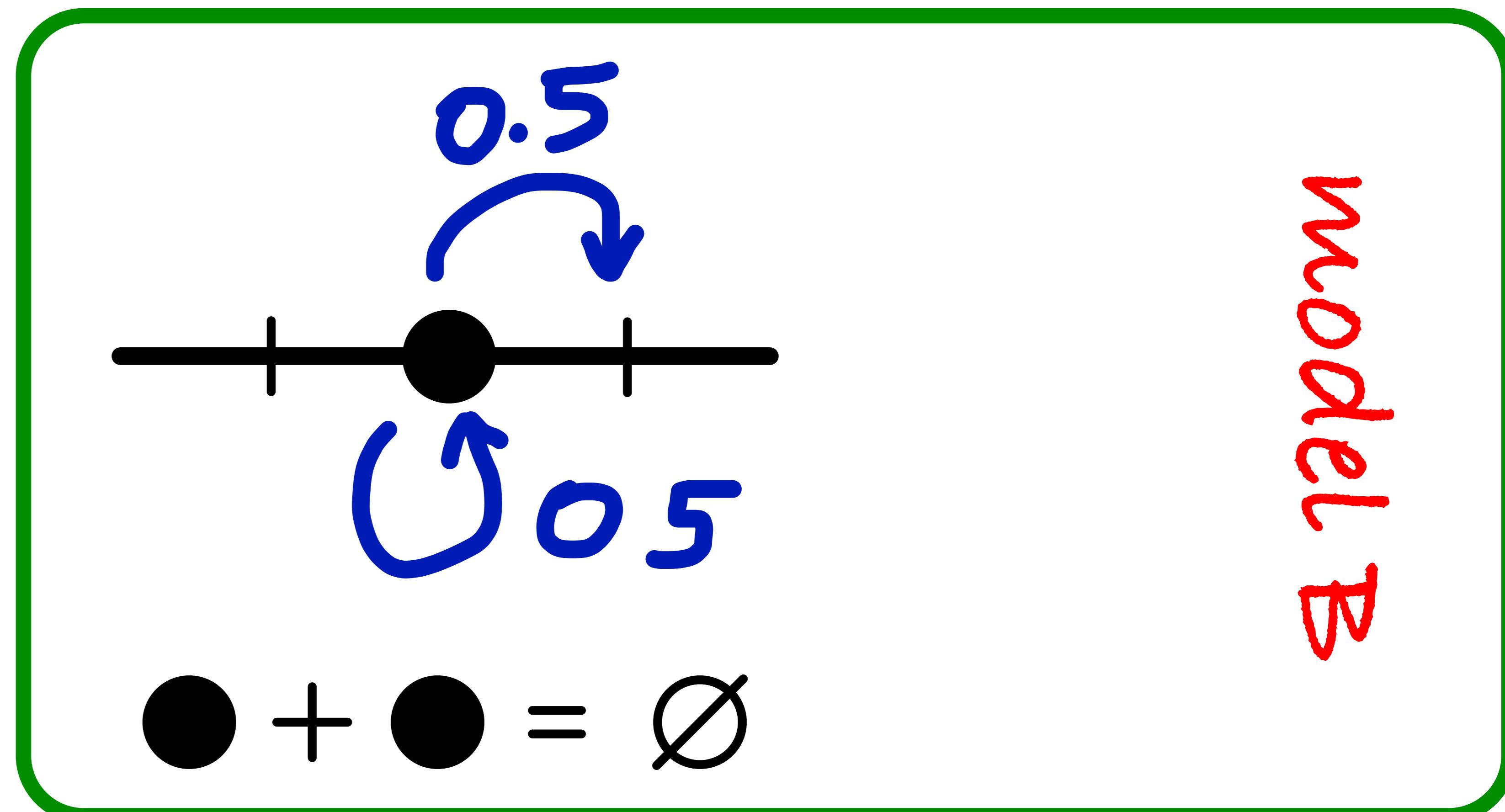
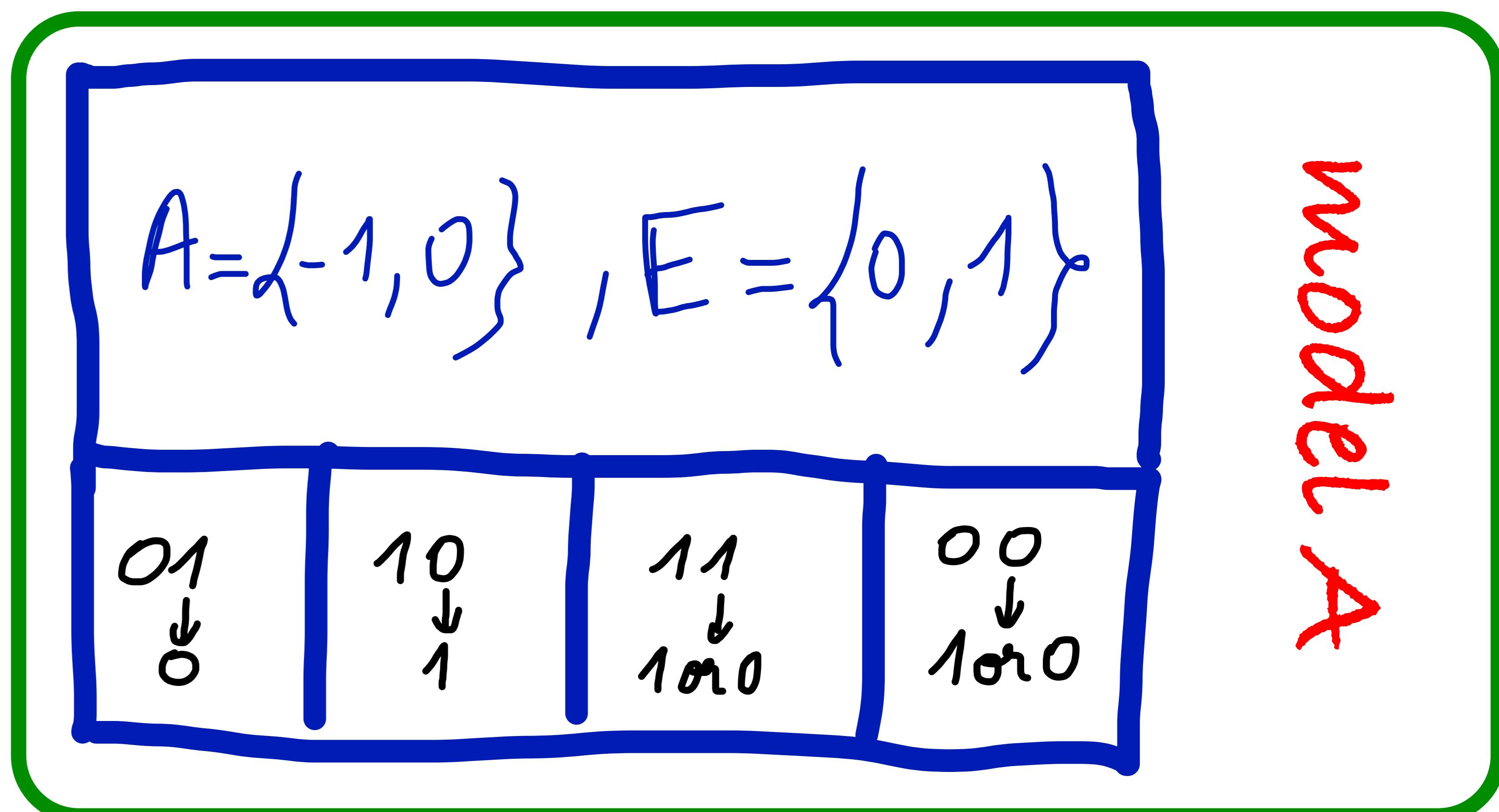




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Model C dominates model B



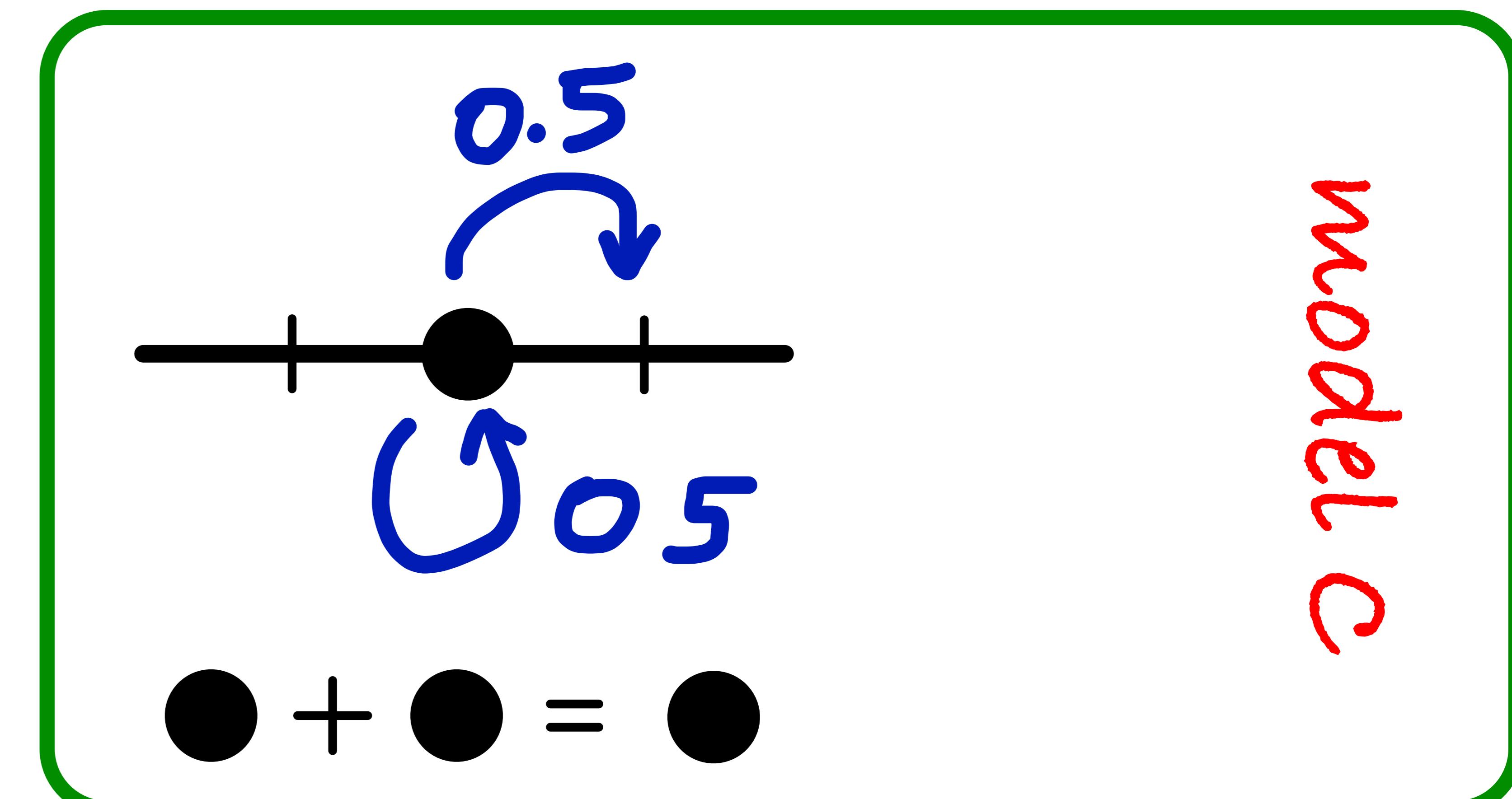
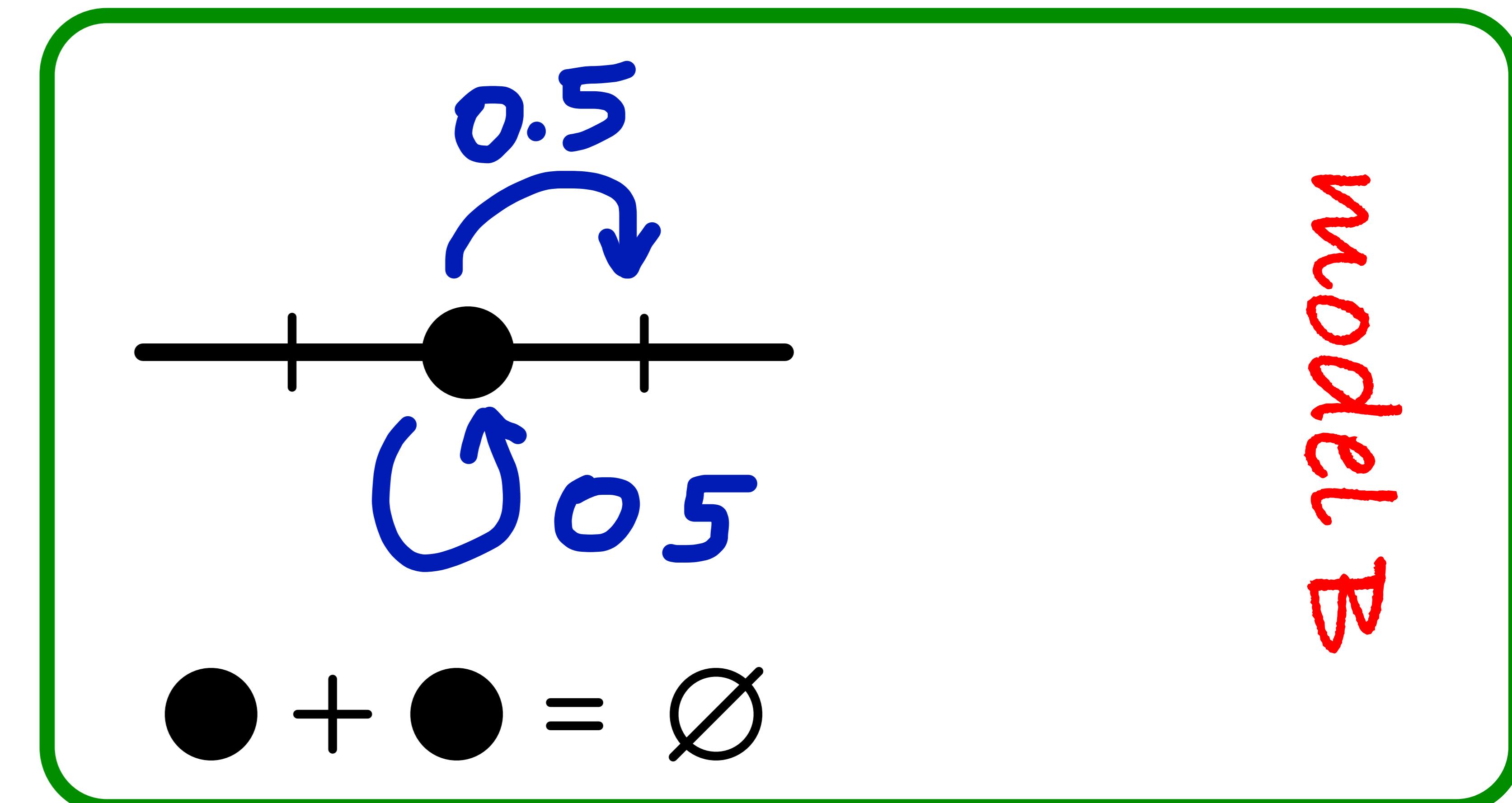
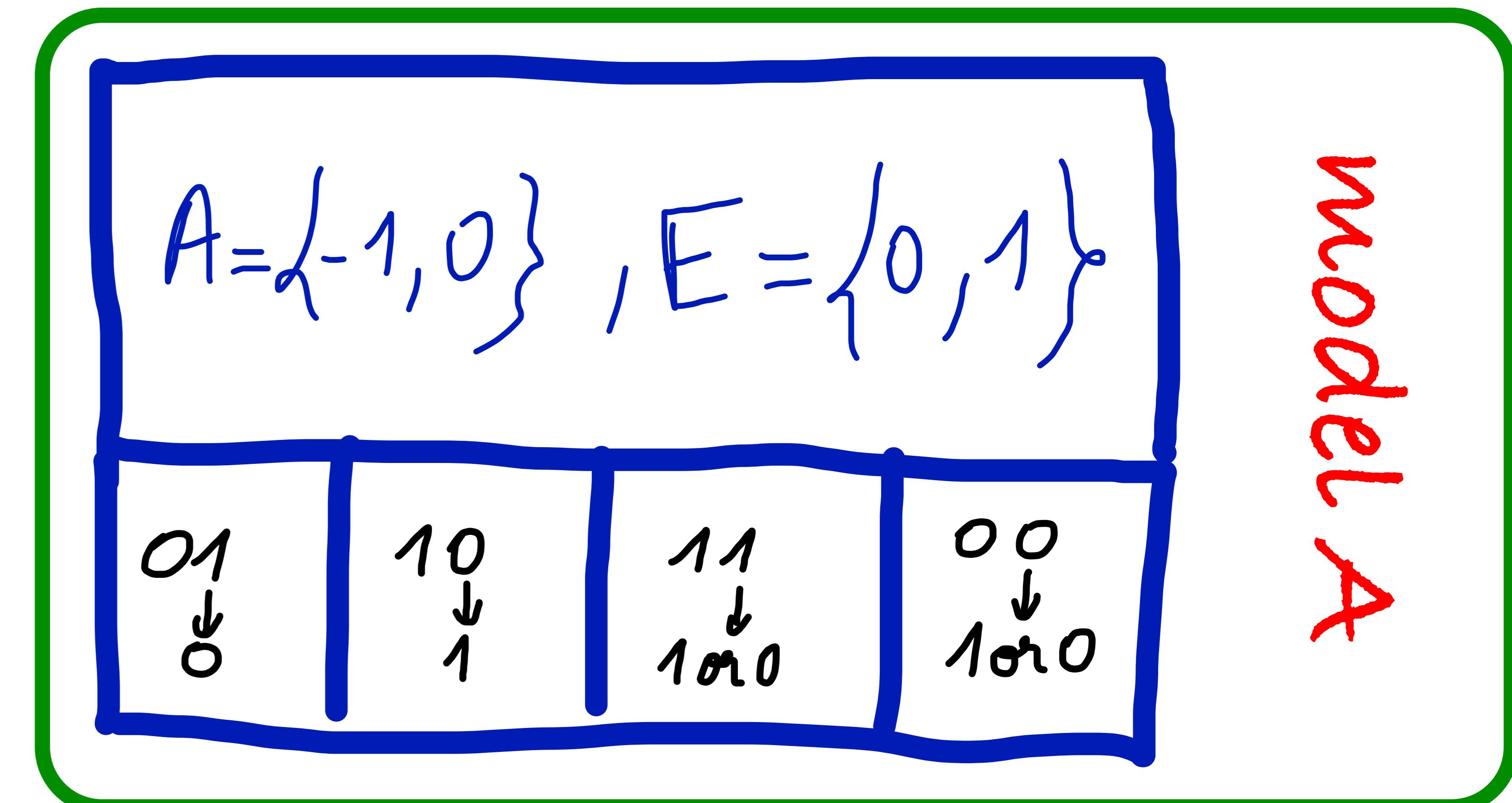


Model B is not monotone

starting from anywhere

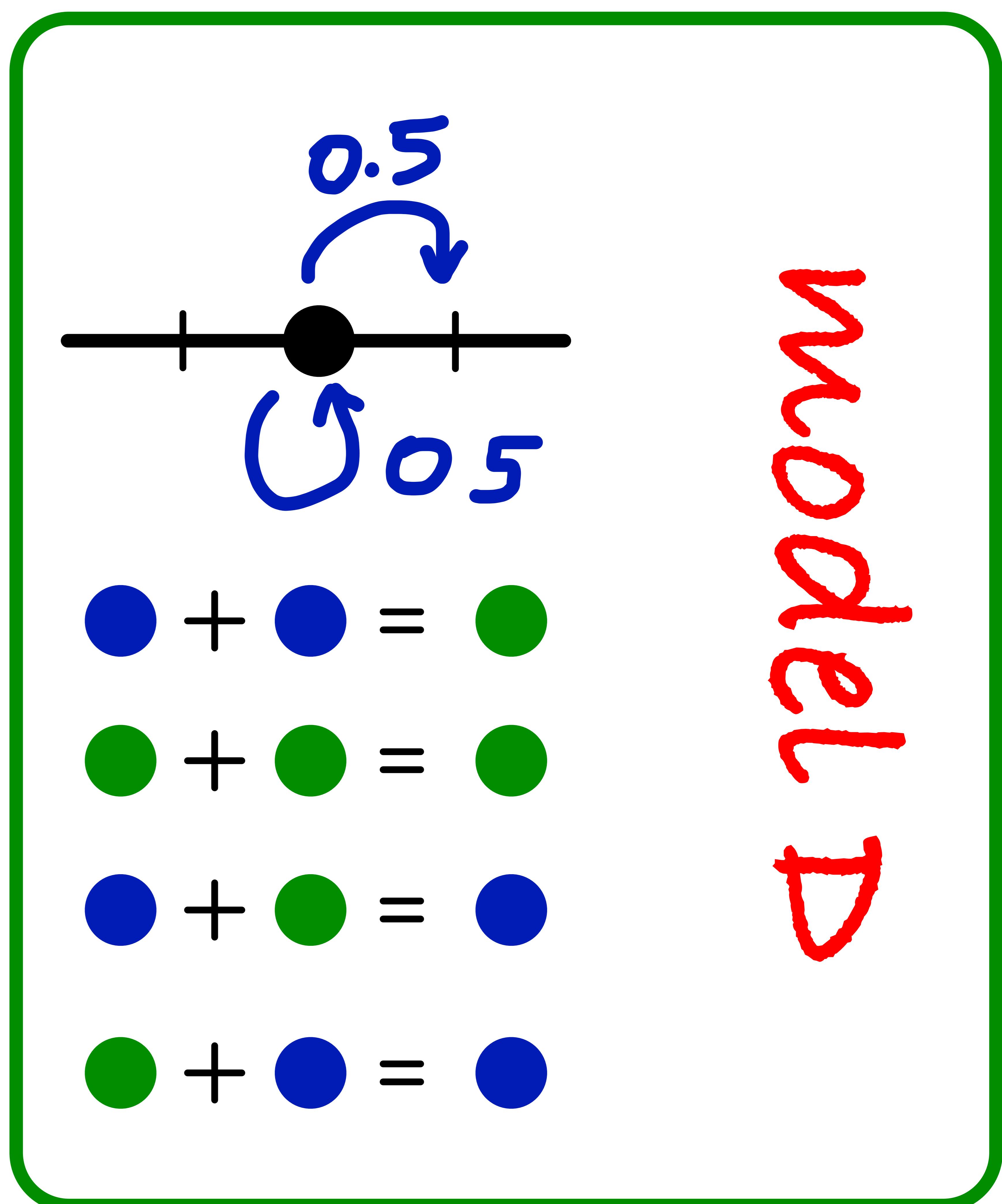
Model C dominates model B

* ⚡ Blue + green = model C

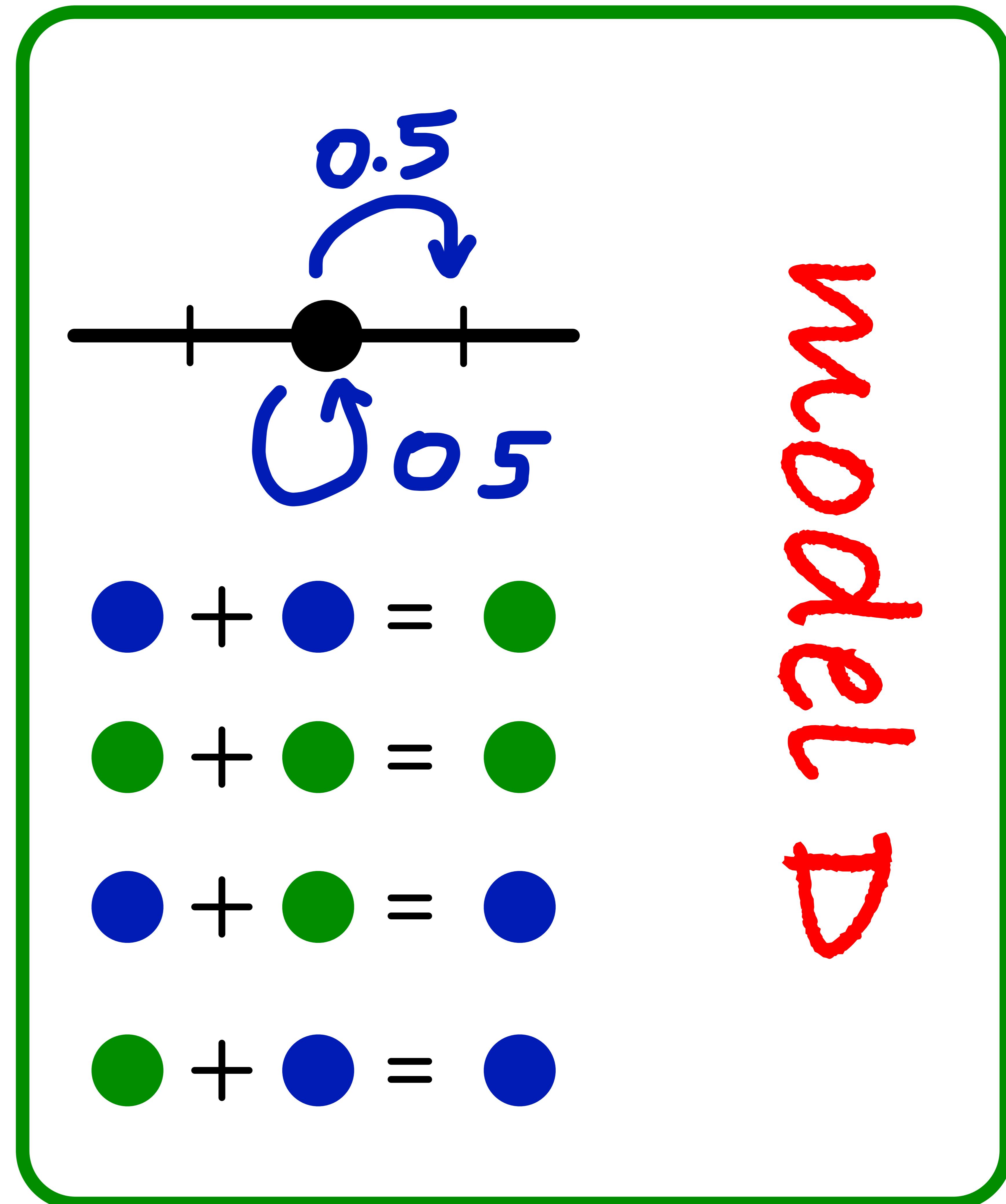
Blue alone = model B




* ⚡ Blue + green = model C

→ domination of model B, starting
anywhere, by full model C.

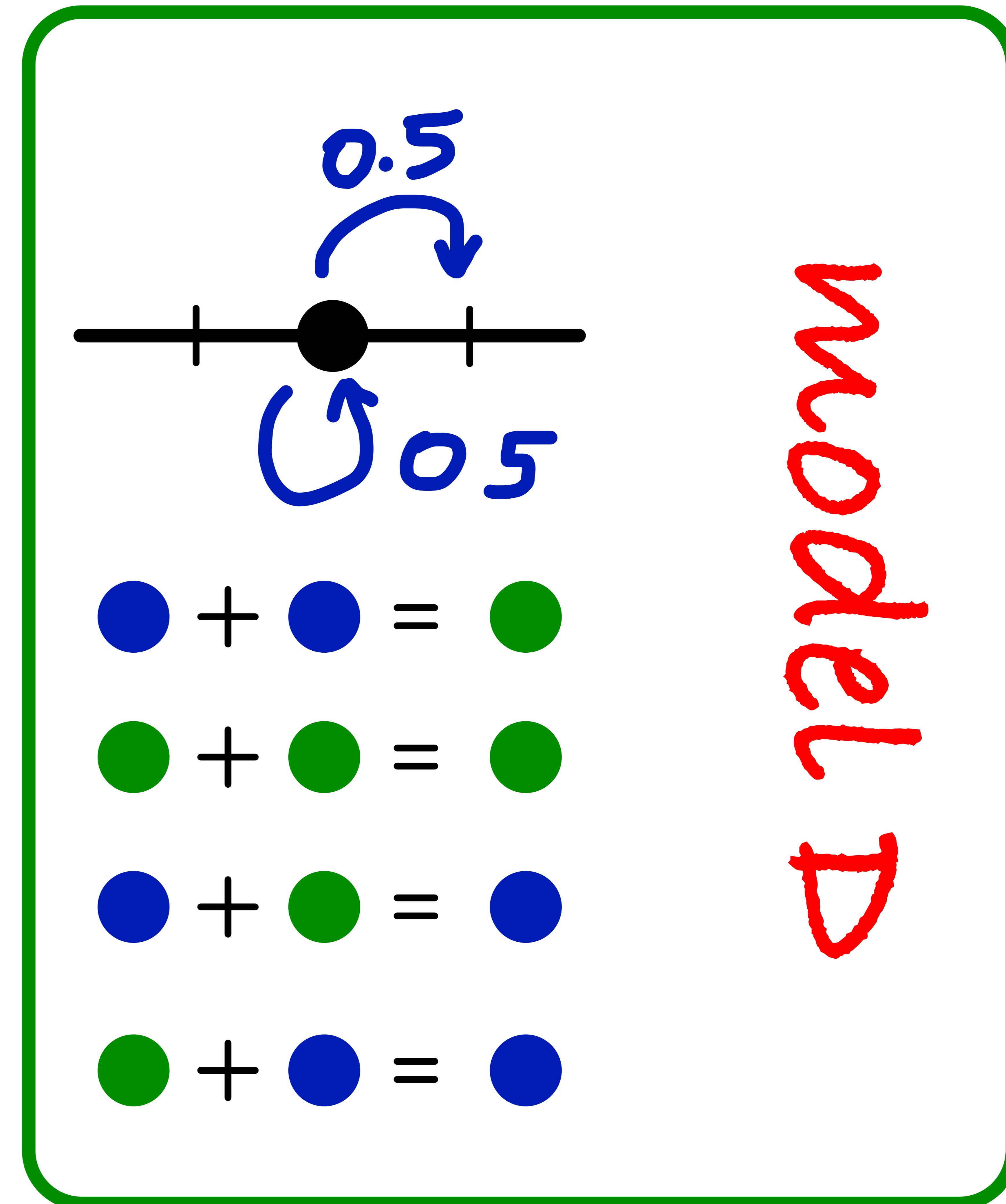




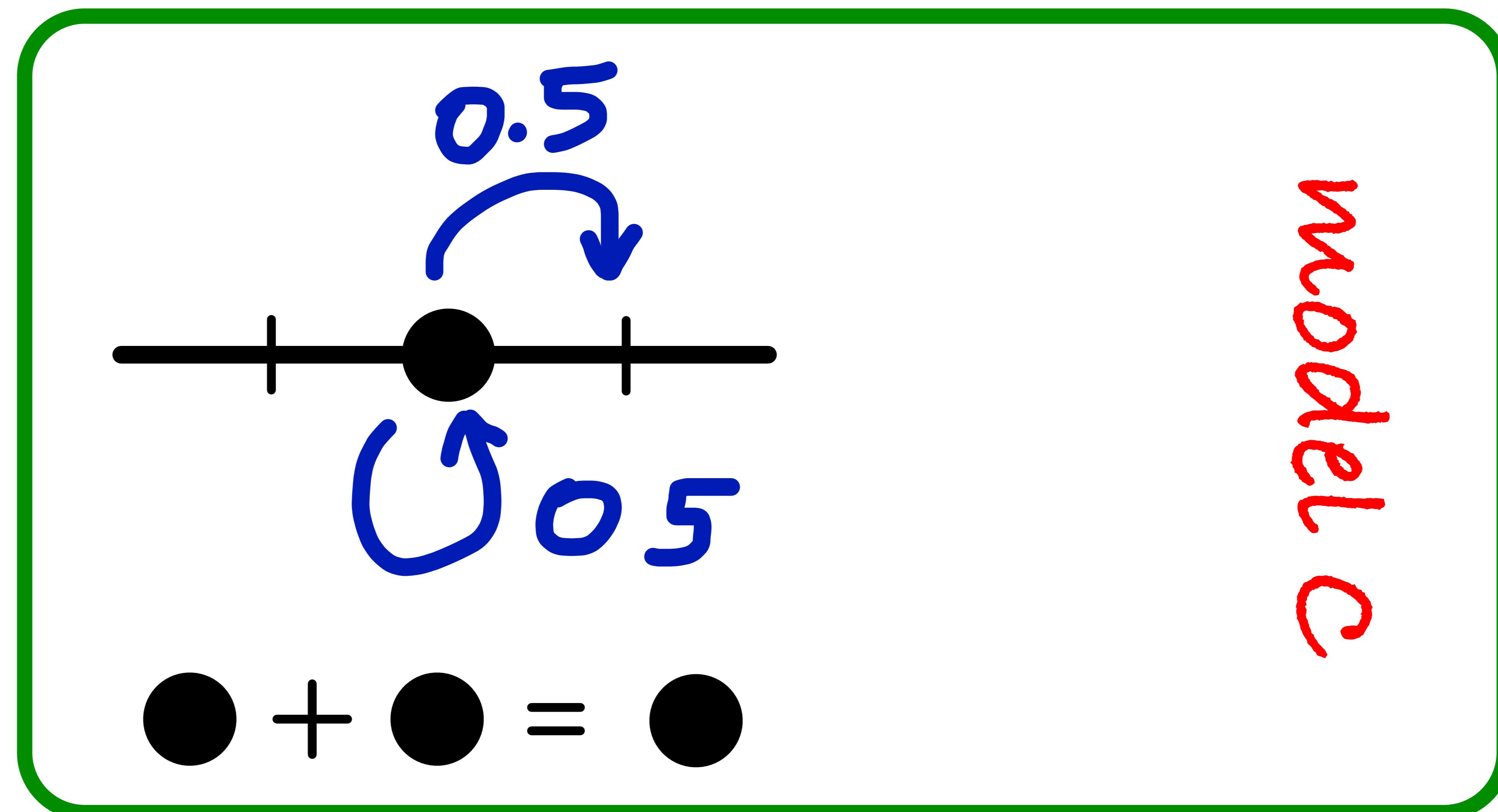
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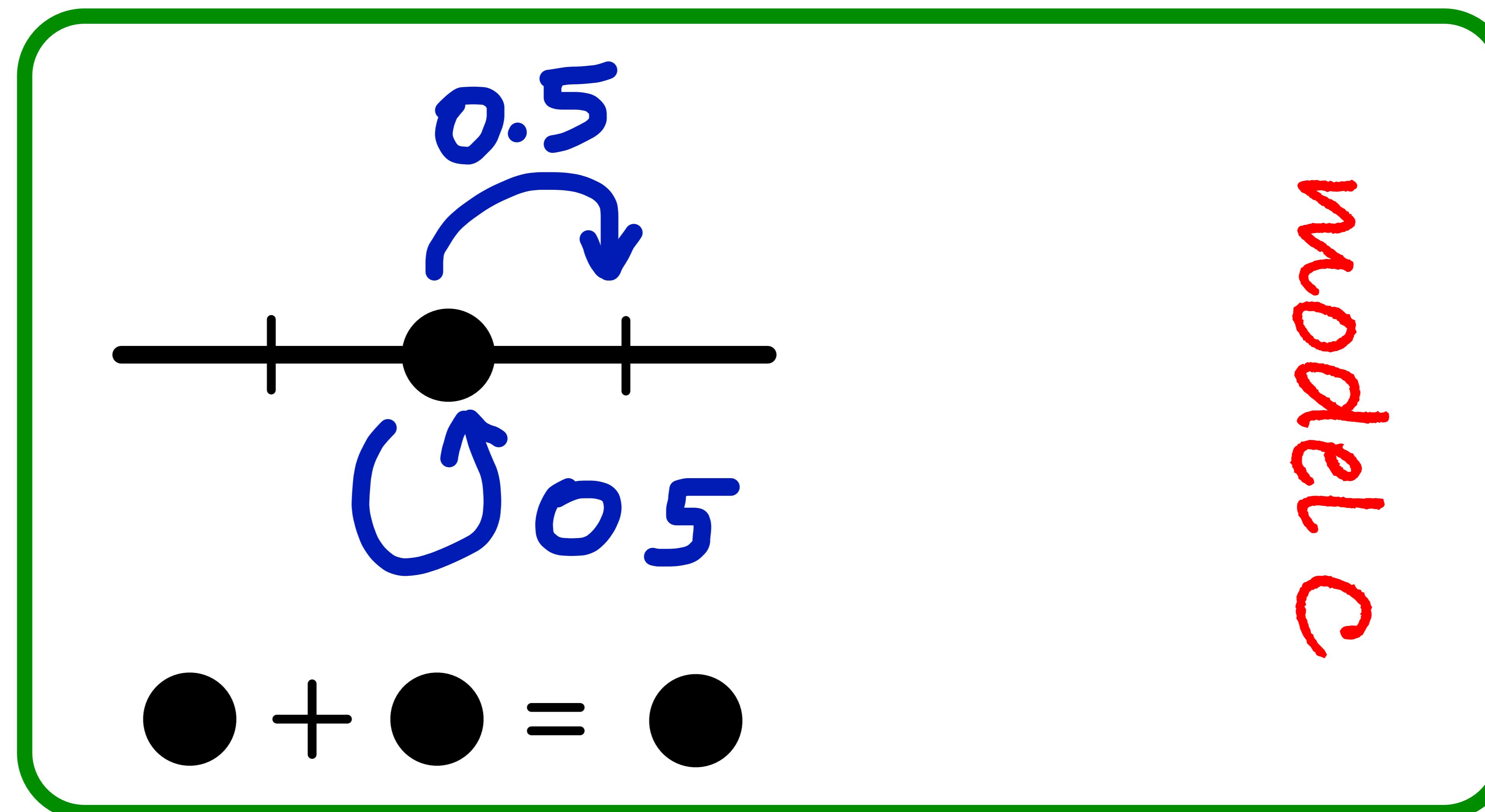


Toom conjectures an exponential rate of convergence for any ergodic PCA. Actually ...

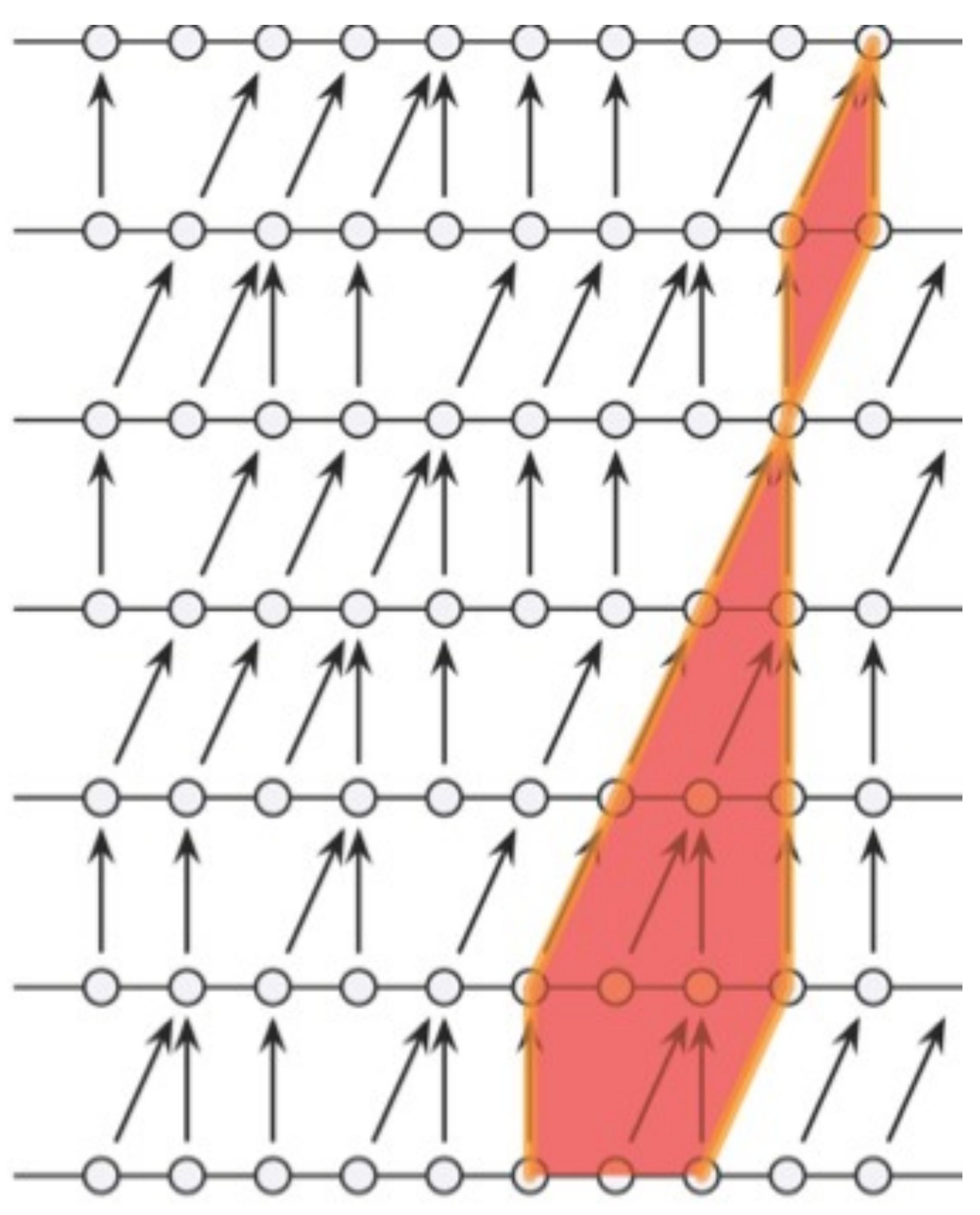
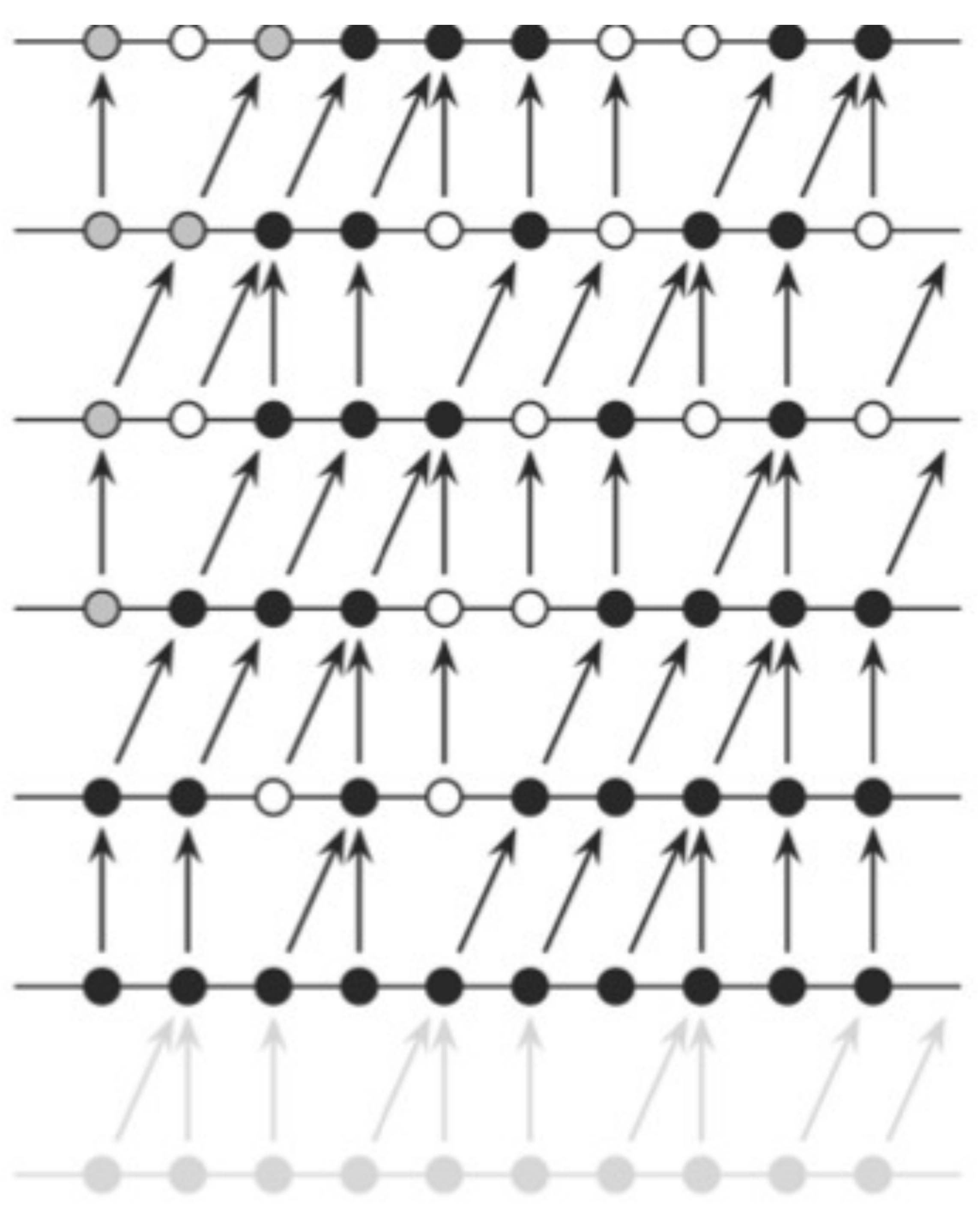
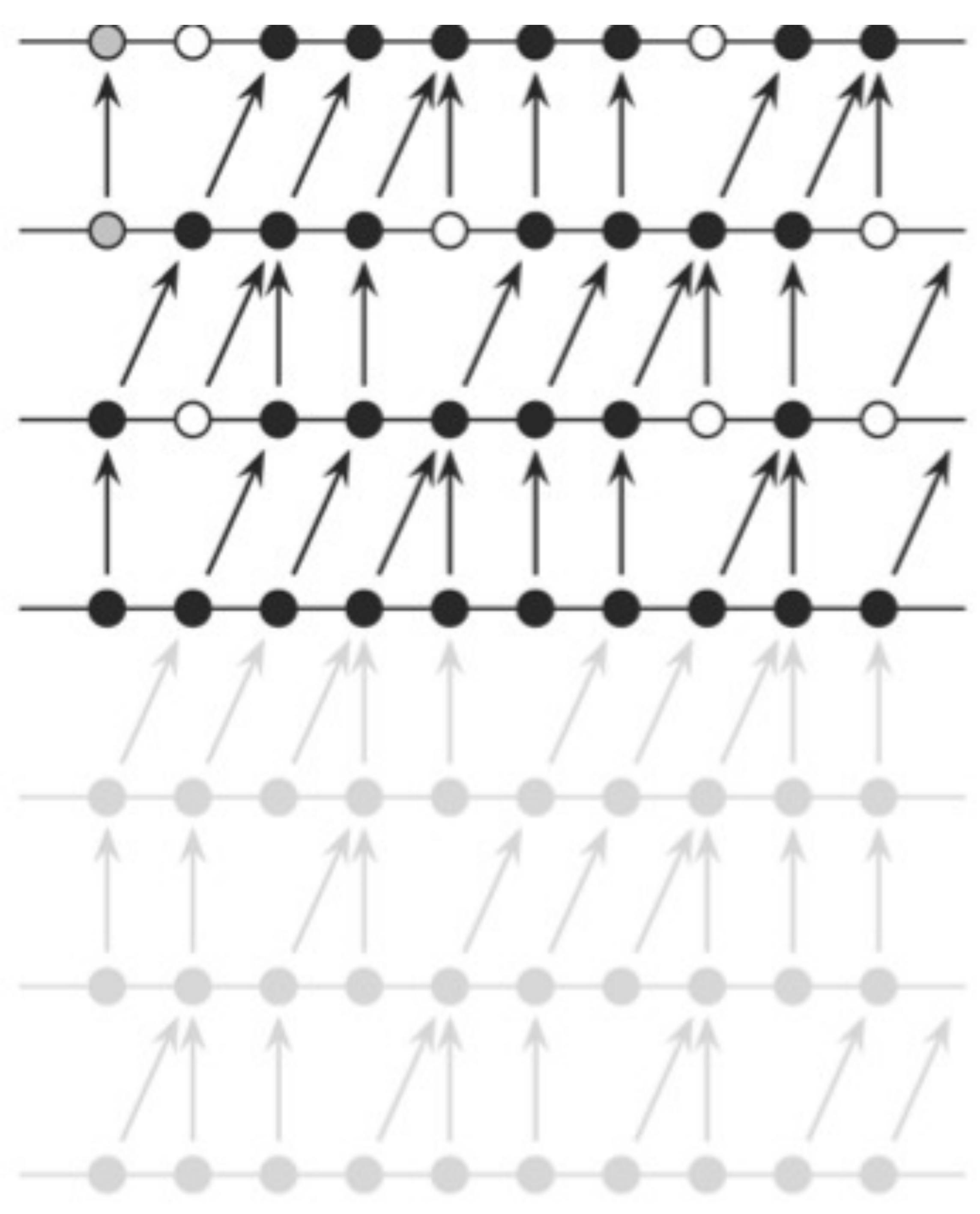
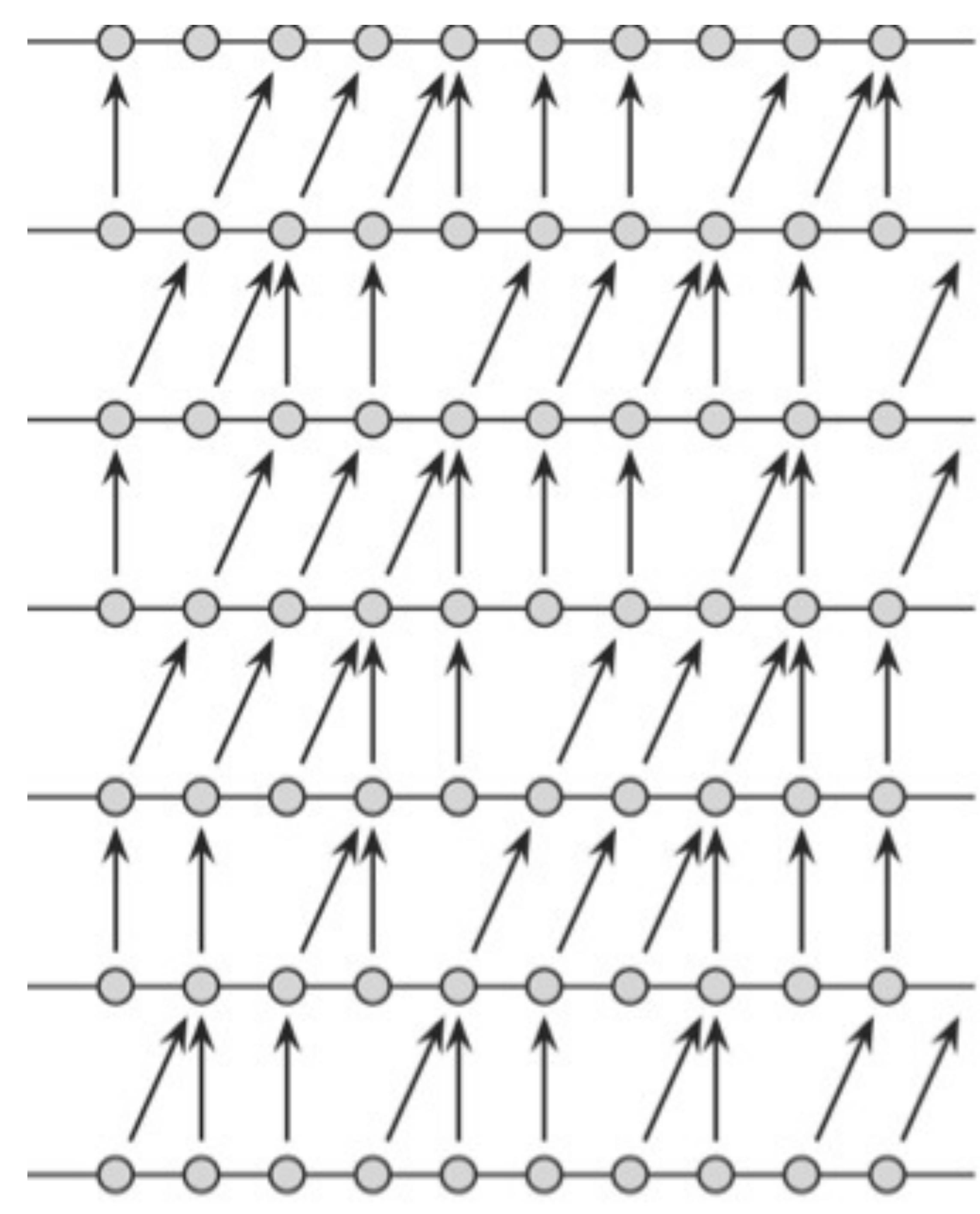
$$d_n = 4^{-n} \binom{2n+1}{n} \sim \frac{2}{\sqrt{\pi n}}$$

$d_n = P(T > 2n)$, in which T is the hitting time of 2
for a symmetric random walk starting from 0



Model C, starting from $\mathbb{O}^{\mathbb{Z}}$, what is the law of η_t ,
the state of the whole line at time t ?

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Fact: the process $\cdot k \rightarrow \eta_t(k) \in \{0, \bullet\}$
 $\mathbb{Z} \longrightarrow \{0, \bullet\}$

is stationary, reversible and ergodic, but
is **not** Markov, at any order ...

Theorem (Chassaing & Mercier, 2011)

$$P_{t,m} \stackrel{\text{def}}{=} P(\eta_t([m]) = \bullet^m) = 2^{-t(m+1)} \prod_{1 \leq i \leq j \leq t} \frac{m+i+j}{t+i-j}$$
