Edge coloring



χ'_ℓ : Minimum size of every $L(e)$ such that

$$\begin{array}{c} \textcircled{u} \xrightarrow{a} \textcircled{v} \xrightarrow{b} \textcircled{w} \\ u \qquad v \qquad w \end{array} \Rightarrow \left\{ \begin{array}{l} a \neq b \\ a \in L(u, v) \\ b \in L(v, w) \end{array} \right.$$

Conjecture (List Coloring Conjecture)

$$\chi'_\ell = \chi' \leq \Delta + 1.$$

Conjecture (Zhang Liu Wang 2002)

For *connected graphs on at least 6 vertices*, $\chi'_{avd} \leq \Delta + 2$.

State of the art

Theorem (Hatami 2005)

$$\Delta \geq 10^{20} \Rightarrow \chi'_{avd} \leq \Delta + 300.$$

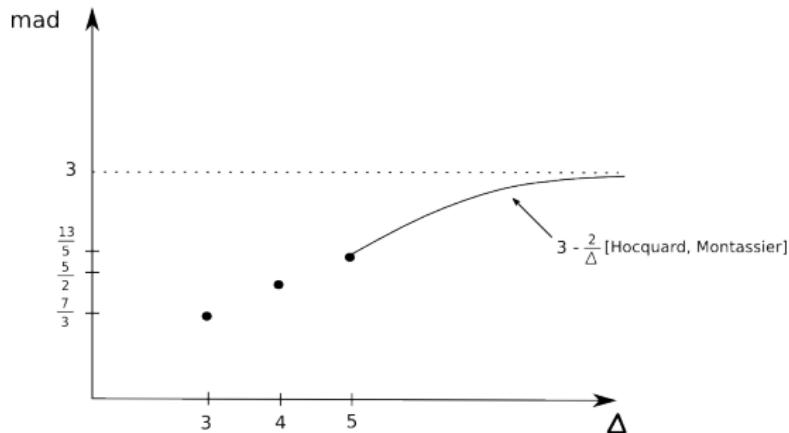
Theorem (Wang Wang 2010)

$$\text{mad} < 3 \Rightarrow \chi'_{\text{avd}} \leq \Delta + 2.$$

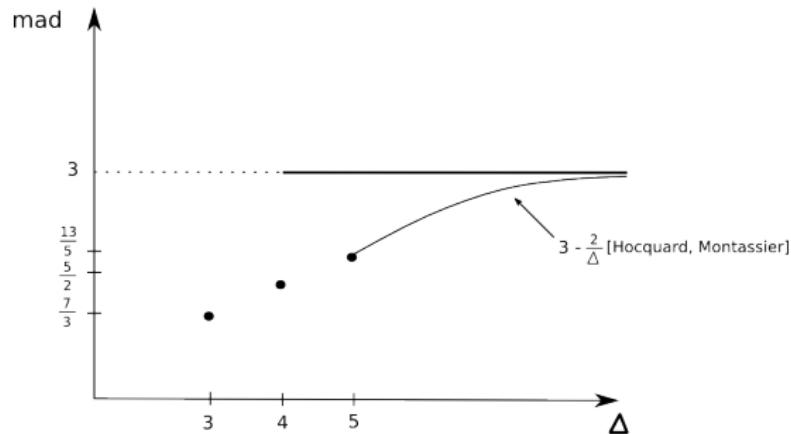
Theorem (Hocquard Montassier 2011)

$$\forall \epsilon \leq \frac{2}{5}, \text{ mad} < 3 - \epsilon, \Delta \geq \frac{2}{\epsilon} \Rightarrow \chi'_{\text{avd}} \leq \Delta + 1$$

In a minimal counter-example, there is no:

- Vertex adjacent to many vertices of degree 1.
-  ($M \ll \Delta$).

Theorem (Woodall 2010)

$$\forall m \geq 2, \text{mad} < m, \Delta \geq 2 \times m^2 \Rightarrow \chi'_{\ell} = \Delta.$$

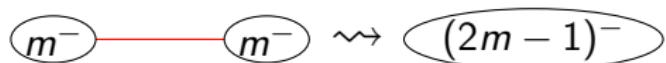

Theorem (Galvin 1995)

Any *bipartite multigraph* G is *L-edge-colorable* if
 $\forall (u, v) \in E(G), |L(u, v)| \geq \max(d(u), d(v))$.

Using list-coloring proofs for avd-coloring



Theorem (Galvin 1995)

Any bipartite multigraph G is L -edge-colorable if
 $\forall (u, v) \in E(G), |L(u, v)| \geq \max(d(u), d(v))$.

$$|\{m^-\}| \leq m \times |\{M^+\}|.$$
