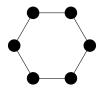

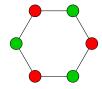

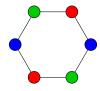

 χ : Minimum number of colors to ensure that

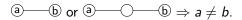
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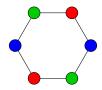


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 χ^2 : Minimum number of colors to ensure that





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 χ^2 : Minimum number of colors to ensure that

$$\textcircled{a}$$
 \textcircled{b} or \textcircled{a} \textcircled{b} \Rightarrow $a \neq b$.

∆: Maximum degree of the graph.

$$\Delta^2 + 1 \ge \chi^2 \ge \Delta + 1$$
.

A graph is planar if it can be drawn in a plane without crossing edges.

Conjecture (Wegner 1977)

If G is a planar graph, then:

- $\chi^2 \le 7$ if $\Delta = 3$
- $\chi^2 \leq \Delta + 5$ if $4 \leq \Delta \leq 7$
- $\chi^2 \le \lfloor \frac{3\Delta}{2} \rfloor + 1$ if $\Delta \ge 8$

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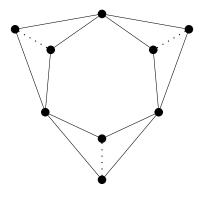
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Sparse planar graphs

 \mathbf{g} : girth = minimum length of a cycle.

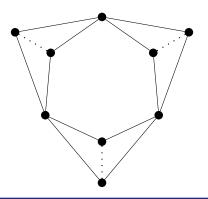

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Sparse planar graphs

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Theorem (Bu, Zhu '11)

Wegner's conjecture is true for planar graphs with $g \ge 6$.

Sparse planar graphs (2)

Question (Wang, Lih '01)

$$g \ge k$$
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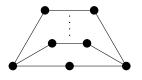
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Theorem (Borodin, Glebov, Ivanova, Neustroeva, Tashkinov '04)

False for $k \le 6$. True for $k \ge 7$.



Theorem (Borodin, Ivanova, Neustroeva '08 & Ivanova '11)

For any planar graph, $\chi^2 = \Delta + 1$ in each of the following cases :

- $g \ge 24$ and $\Delta \ge 3$
- $g \ge 15$ and $\Delta \ge 4$
- $g \geq 12$ and $\Delta \geq 5$

- $g \ge 10$ and $\Delta \ge 6$
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$$|E| - |V| - |F| = -2$$
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$$\sum_{f \in F} \underbrace{\left(d(f) - g\right)}_{>0} + c \cdot \sum_{v \in V} \left(d(v) - \frac{2g}{g - 2}\right) < 0$$

ad: average degree =
$$\frac{\sum d(v)}{|V|} = \frac{2|E|}{|V|}$$

First results on non-planar sparse graphs

Theorem (B., Lévêque, Pinlou '11, Cranston, Škrekovski '13)

For any graph, $\chi^2 = \Delta + 1$ in each of the following cases:

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$$\bullet \ \ \underbrace{mad < \frac{7}{3}}_{g \geq 1/5} \ \ \text{and} \ \ \Delta \geq 4 \qquad \bullet \ \ \underbrace{mad < \frac{18}{7}}_{g \geq 9} \ \ \text{and} \ \ \Delta \geq 8$$

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What about mad < 3?

First results on non-planar sparse graphs (2)

Theorem (B., Lévêque, Pinlou '13)

For a small enough ϵ , mad $< 3 - \epsilon$ and $\Delta \ge \frac{3}{\epsilon^2} \Rightarrow \chi^2 = \Delta + 1$.

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For any bipartite multigraph G, if L is an edge list assignment such that $|L(u,v)| \ge d(u), d(v)$ for every (u,v), then G is L-edge-choosable.

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 \Rightarrow Global discharging method.

$$\Delta^2 + 1 \ge \chi_\ell^2 \ge \chi^2 \ge \Delta + 1.$$

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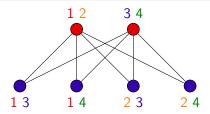
What changes in the previous theorems?

Conjecture (Kostochka, Woodall '01)

For any graph, $\chi^2 = \chi^2_{\ell}$.

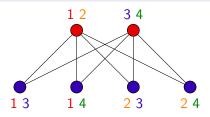
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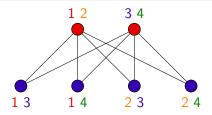


Theorem (Kim, Park '13)

 $\chi_{\ell}^2 - \chi^2$ can be arbitrarily large.

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Theorem (Kim, Kwon, Park '13, Kosar, Petrickova, Reiniger, Yeager '13)

For any k, $\chi_{\ell}^{k} - \chi^{k}$ can be arbitrarily large.

$$\Delta^2+1 \geq \chi^2_\ell \geq \chi^2 \geq \Delta+1.$$

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If $\Delta \geq 3$, no graph satisfies $\chi_{\ell}^2 = \Delta^2$.

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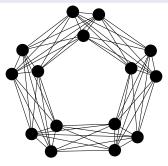
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For any $k \geq 2$, and $\Delta \geq 3$, no graph satisfies $\chi_{\ell}^{k} = D(k, \Delta)$.

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Conclusion

Conjecture

For any
$$k \geq 3$$
, and $\Delta \geq 3$, no graph satisfies $\chi_{\ell}^k \geq D(k, \Delta) - k + 2$.

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Conjecture

For any $k \ge 3$, and $\Delta \ge 3$, no graph satisfies $\chi_{\ell}^k \ge D(k, \Delta) - k + 2$.

Conjecture

For any C and $\epsilon > 0$, mad $< \frac{4C+2}{C+1} - \epsilon$ and $\Delta \ge f(C, \epsilon) \Rightarrow \chi_{\ell}^2 \le \Delta + C$.
