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Free groups

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Free groups

A an alphabet; F(A), the free group over A, is the set of *reduced* words over $A \cup A^{-1}$, without factors aa^{-1} or $a^{-1}a$

 F(A) has several bases, but all have the same cardinality, the rank of F(A)

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Free groups

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- Subgroups of free groups are free, but

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- F_2 contains F_n for every $n \ge 1$, and also F_∞

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- Subgroups of free groups are free, but
- F_2 contains F_n for every $n \ge 1$, and also F_∞
- $a_n \mapsto a^n b^n$ is injective from F_∞ to F_2

How does a (finitely generated) free group sit as a subgroup in another?

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A general problem

How does a (finitely generated) free group sit as a subgroup in another? If A is a basis of F and $B \subseteq A$, $\langle B \rangle$ is a *free factor* of F, $\langle B \rangle \leq_{\rm ff} F$

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• In
$$F = F(a, b, c)$$
, $H = \langle a, b \rangle \leq_{\text{ff}} F$

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- ▶ but also K = ⟨ab², bac⟩ ≤_{ff} F since {ab², bac, b} is a basis of F

- ▶ *H* and *K* both have rank 2 and if we define $\varphi \colon F \to F$ by $\varphi(a) = ab^2$, $\varphi(b) = bac$ and $\varphi(c) = b$, then $\varphi \in Aut(F)$ and $\varphi(H) = K$

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In that case, say that H and K are *congruent*

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In that case, say that H and K are congruent Thus: two free factors of F are congruent if and only if they have the same rank

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For more general subgroups of F, the equality of ranks is necessary but not sufficient

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- ► For instance, if *H* and *K* are congruent, *H* and *K* must have congruent radical closures \sqrt{H} and \sqrt{K} , where

$$\sqrt{H} = \langle x \in F \mid x^n \in H \text{ for some } n \in 0 \rangle$$

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 There exists a nice Whitehead-style algorithm to decide whether two finitely generated subgroups of F are congruent (Gersten)

but this algorithm is not completely satisfactory: if H and K are not congruent, it does not always tell you why – we would like a classification of the congruence classes of subgroups; ideally, a computable list of invariants of a subgroup H, characterizing its congruence class

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We don't solve this problem, but discuss one such invariant, the *semilattice of algebraic extensions of H*, which

must be preserved by the congruence relation

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- must be preserved by the congruence relation
- is computable
- describes the way H sits in larger subgroups of F
- is related with Takahasi's theorem (1951)

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Takahasi's theorem

Theorem Let $H \leq_{fg} F$ (H is a finitely generated subgroup of F).

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Many fun applications: as an exercise, show that if (H_i)_{i≥0} is a chain of subgroups of F with bounded rank (there exists n such that rk(H_i) ≤ n for each i), then (H_i) is eventually constant

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- ► Such a family H₁,..., H_n (a Takahasi family for H), can be effectively computed

A spanning tree has |V| - 1 edges, so $\mathsf{rk}(H) = |E|_{\overline{\mathcal{I}}} |V|_{\mathcal{I}} + 1_{\overline{\mathcal{I}}}$

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
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
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There is a graph morphism $\varphi_{H,K} \colon \Gamma_A(H) \to \Gamma_A(K)$ if and only if $H \leq K$

- ▶ If $\varphi_{H,K}$ is one-to-one, then $H \leq_{\rm ff} K$
- If φ_{H,K} is onto, we say that K is an overgroup of H (a finite number of them, which depends on A)

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Proof of Takahasi's theorem

Theorem

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 That's it! The set of overgroups of H is a Takahasi family for H: if H ≤ K, then K is a free extension of an overgroup of H – besides, H has finitely many overgroups, and they are computable.

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- But it is not a canonical family

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Algebraic extensions

Let $H \leq K \leq F$. Say that K is an algebraic extension of H ($H \leq_{alg} K$) if no proper free factor of K contains H, that is, $H \leq L \leq_{ff} K \Longrightarrow L = K$

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Algebraic extensions

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▶ If $H \leq_{\text{alg}} K$, there exists $L \in \mathcal{L}$ such that $H \leq L \leq_{\text{ff}} K$, so L = K, and $AE(H) \subseteq \mathcal{L}$

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Algebraic extensions

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- ▶ If $H \leq_{alg} K$, there exists $L \in \mathcal{L}$ such that $H \leq L \leq_{ff} K$, so L = K, and $AE(H) \subseteq \mathcal{L}$
- If K is ≤_{ff}-minimal in L and H ≤ L ≤_{ff} K, then H ≤ M ≤_{ff} L for some M ∈ L, so M ≤_{ff} K, and by minimality, M = L = K, that is, K ∈ AE(H)

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- If H ≤_{fi} F, then every K such that H ≤ K ≤ F is an algebraic extension

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Examples

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- ▶ If $H \le F_2$ and H is non-cyclic, then $H \le_{\mathsf{alg}} F_2$
- $\langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}\rangle \leq_{alg} F_2$ (more generally, $\langle x \rangle$ where x is not a power of a primitive element)
- If H ≤_{fi} F, then every K such that H ≤ K ≤ F is an algebraic extension
- If H ≤_{ff} F, then AE(H) = {H}. For instance, no non-trivial overgroup of (ab, aca) is an algebraic extension

- using the Whitehead algorithm, which determines whether a subgroup is a free factor in another

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About terminology

Let H ≤ K ≤ F and x ∈ K. Say x is K-algebraic over H if every free factor of K containing H, also contains x:

- ▶ Otherwise, x is K-transcendental over H. In fact, this is if and only if (H, x) = H * (x)

- ► Every element of K \ H is K-transcendental over H iff H ≤_{ff} K.

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- ► Otherwise, x is K-transcendental over H. In fact, this is if and only if (H, x) = H * (x)
- ► Every element of K \ H is K-transcendental over H iff H ≤_{ff} K.
- Let H ≤ K. Then H ≤_{alg} K iff every element of K is K-algebraic over H

Note that the property of being K-algebraic over H, depends on K

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Composition of extensions

- (i) If $H \leq_{\mathsf{alg}} K_1 \leq_{\mathsf{alg}} K$ then $H \leq_{\mathsf{alg}} K$.
- (i') If $H \leq_{\text{ff}} K_1 \leq_{\text{ff}} K$ then $H \leq_{\text{ff}} K$.
- (ii) If $H \leq_{alg} K$ then $K_1 \leq_{alg} K$, while $H \leq K_1$ need not be algebraic.

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- (ii') If $H \leq_{\rm ff} K$ then $H \leq_{\rm ff} K_1$, while $K_1 \leq K$ need not be purely transcendental.

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- (iii) If $H \leq_{\text{alg}} K_1$ and $H \leq_{\text{alg}} K_2$ then $H \leq_{\text{alg}} \langle K_1 \cup K_2 \rangle$, while $H \leq K_1 \cap K_2$ need not be algebraic.

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- (iii') If $H \leq_{\text{ff}} K_1$ and $H \leq_{\text{ff}} K_2$ then $H \leq_{\text{ff}} K_1 \cap K_2$, while $H \leq \langle K_1 \cup K_2 \rangle$ need not be purely transcendental.

More precisely, if $H \le K$, there exists a unique *L* such that $H \le_{alg} L \le_{ff} K$, and *L* is

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- ► the intersection of the free factors of K containing H (and hence the least free factor of K containing H)
- the greatest algebraic extension of H in K

- ▶ the set of elements, that are *K*-algebraic over *H*

This extension L is called the algebraic closure of H in K

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$$\blacktriangleright H \leq_{\mathsf{ealg}} K \Longrightarrow \mathsf{rk}(K) \leq \mathsf{rk}(H)$$

▶ Not every algebraic extension is elementary algebraic; e.g. $\langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}\rangle \leq_{alg} F_2$ but $rk(\langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}, x\rangle) = 2$ for each $x \notin \langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}\rangle$

$$\blacktriangleright H \leq_{\mathsf{ealg}} K \Longrightarrow \mathsf{rk}(K) \leq \mathsf{rk}(H)$$

▶ Not every algebraic extension is elementary algebraic; e.g. $\langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}\rangle \leq_{\mathsf{alg}} F_2$ but $\mathsf{rk}(\langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}, x\rangle) = 2$ for each $x \notin \langle aba^{-1}b^{-1}\rangle$

• Every $H \leq_{fg} F$ has an e-algebraic closure, which is computable

- It follows that L satisfies P, and the intersection of the K containing H and satisfying P is the finite intersection of the algebraic extensions of H satisfying P

Closure of a subgroup in a profinite topology

If V is a pseudovariety of finite groups which is extension-closed, the property of being closed in the pro-V topology of the free group is closed under intersection and free factors

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Closure of a subgroup in a profinite topology

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- However, it is not always computable
- Note that rk(cl_V(H)) ≤ rk(H), but it is not known whether this is because H ≤_{ealg} cl_V(H)

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Equations over subgroups

Let H ≤ F. An H-equation is a word e ∈ H * ⟨X⟩, where X is a new symbol (the unknown). A solution of H is an element x such that e(x) = 1

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- ► Thus x is a solution of some H-equation if and only if the homomorphism H * ⟨X⟩ → ⟨H, x⟩ is not one-to-one, if and only ⟨H, x⟩ has rank at most rk(H), if and only if H ≤_{alg} ⟨H, x⟩

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- ► an equation is an element *e* of the countably generated free group F(X, Y₁,..., Y_n,...)
- ▶ Let *E* be a set of equations: say that *H* is *E*-closed if *H* contains every solution of every particularization over *H* of an equation in *E*.

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Let *E_{mal}* = {*X⁻¹Y₁XY₂*}. A solution of a particularization of this equation over *H* is an element *x* such that *H^x* ∩ *H* ≠ 1,

- ▶ Let $\mathcal{E}_{mal} = \{X^{-1}Y_1XY_2\}$. A solution of a particularization of this equation over *H* is an element *x* such that $H^x \cap H \neq 1$,
- ▶ so *H* is \mathcal{E}_{mal} -closed if and only if *H* is malnormal.

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- Similarly, let *E_{pure}* = {*XⁿY*₁ | *n* ≥ 2}. Then *H* is *E_{pure}*-closed if and only if *H* is pure.

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Malnormality, purity, etc Profinite topologies Equations

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- ▶ In addition, $H \leq_{ealg} cl_{\mathcal{E}}(H)$, so $rk(cl_{\mathcal{E}}(H)) \leq rk(H)$

Thus the malnormal closure of $H \leq_{fg} F$ has rank at most rk(H), as well as the pure closure...

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
