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  - dedicated algorithms
- Semi-algorithms for general classes
  - no termination guarantee

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- $\blacksquare$  Set  $R \subseteq 2^S$  of regions
  - closure under set operations ( $\cap$ , \)
  - □ closure under post/pre : post( $r, \sigma$ )  $\in R$  and pre( $r, \sigma$ )  $\in R$
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- Speeds up post\*/pre\* computation
- Accelerated symbolic model-checkers: LASH, TReX, FAST

## Decidable classes vs. Acceleration

Effective computation of  $\operatorname{post}^*/\operatorname{pre}^*$ 

- 2-dim VASS and extensions
- Lossy VASS
- Timed automata
- Lossy Fifo systems
- Pushdown systems
- **...**

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Termination of accelerated semi-algorithms on decidable classes?

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  - $\square$   $S'_i$  is "extracted" from S
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- This paper: 2-dim VASS are flat
- 2-dim VASS have an effectively semilinear binary reachability relation

- Finite automaton
- Counters (over N)
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$$(p, (5, 0, 1)) \xrightarrow{t_1} (p, (5, 1, 0)) \xrightarrow{t_2} (q, (5, 1, 0)) \xrightarrow{t_3} (q, (5, 0, 2))$$
$$\downarrow t_4$$
$$\dots (q, (4, 0, 4)) \xleftarrow{t_2^2} (q, (4, 2, 0)) \xleftarrow{t_2} (p, (4, 2, 0)) \xleftarrow{t_1^2} (p, (4, 0, 2))$$

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Equivalent to Petri nets with n unbounded places

## VASS: syntax



- Labeled directed graph  $V = (Q, T, \alpha, \beta, \delta)$ 
  - $\blacksquare$  Q : finite set of locations and T : finite set of transitions
  - source mapping  $\alpha: T \to Q$  and target mapping  $\beta: T \to Q$
  - $\delta: T \to \mathbb{Z}^n$  : displacement labeling

■ Paths: 
$$\Pi_V(q,q') \subseteq T^*$$
,  $\Pi_V = \bigcup_{q,q' \in Q} \Pi_V(q,q')$ 

## VASS: semantics

- $\blacksquare V = (Q,T,\alpha,\beta,\delta)$
- $\blacksquare Q, T$ : finite sets
- $\blacksquare \ \alpha,\beta:T \to Q$
- $\bullet \delta: T \to \mathbb{Z}^n$



■ Labeled transition system  $\langle C_V, T, \mathcal{R}_V \rangle$  where:

-m

$$C_V = Q \times \mathbb{N}^n$$

$$(q, \mathbf{x}) \mathcal{R}_V(t) (q', \mathbf{x}') \quad \text{if} \quad \begin{cases} q = \alpha(t) \\ q' = \beta(t) \\ \mathbf{x}' = \mathbf{x} + \delta(t) \end{cases}$$

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- Labeled transition system  $\langle C_V, T, \mathcal{R}_V \rangle$
- I Extension of  $\delta$  and  $\mathcal{R}_V$  to words  $\pi \in T^*$  and languages  $L \subseteq T^*$ :

$$\begin{cases} \delta(\varepsilon) = 0 \\ \delta(\pi \cdot t) = \delta(\pi) + \delta(t) \\ \delta(L) = \{\delta(\pi) / \pi \in L\} \end{cases} \qquad \begin{cases} \mathcal{R}_V(\varepsilon) = Id_{\mathcal{C}_V} \\ \mathcal{R}_V(\pi \cdot t) = \mathcal{R}_V(\pi) \cdot \mathcal{R}_V(t) \\ \mathcal{R}_V(L) = \bigcup_{\pi \in L} \mathcal{R}_V(\pi) \end{cases}$$

#### Semilinear sets

 $\square$  Given  $P \subseteq \mathbb{Z}^n$ ,

$$P^* = \left\{ \sum_{i=0}^k c_i \, \mathsf{p}_i \ / \ k, c_0, \dots, c_k \in \mathbb{N} \text{ and } \mathsf{p}_0, \dots, \mathsf{p}_k \in P \right\}$$

■ Linear set:  $(x + P^*)$  with  $x \in \mathbb{Z}^n$  and  $P \subseteq \mathbb{Z}^n$  finite

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- Semilinear set: finite union of linear sets
- Semilinear sets are the subsets of  $\mathbb{Z}^n$  that are definable in Presburger arithmetic  $\langle \mathbb{Z}, \leq, + \rangle$  [GS66]

- Linear path scheme:  $\rho = \sigma_0 \theta_1^* \sigma_1 \cdots \theta_k^* \sigma_k \subseteq \Pi_V$  with  $\sigma_i, \theta_i \in T^*$
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#### Definition

- A reachability subrelation  $R \subseteq \mathcal{R}_V^*$  is flat if  $R \subseteq \mathcal{R}_V(\rho)$  for some SLPS  $\rho$
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**Corollary.**  $\mathcal{R}_V^*$  is effectively semilinear for any flat VASS V

Goal: find SLPS  $\rho$  such that  $\mathcal{R}^* \subseteq \mathcal{R}(\rho)$ 

 $\blacksquare \text{ Goal: find SLPS } \rho \text{ such that } \mathcal{R}^*|_{[c \, . \, \infty]^2} \subseteq \mathcal{R}(\rho) \text{ for some } c \in \mathbb{N}$ 

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First, look for SLPS that capture all possible displacements

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**Lemma.**  $\exists \rho_{q,q'} \subseteq \Pi(q,q')$  *SLPS such that*  $\delta(\rho_{q,q'}) = \delta(\Pi(q,q'))$

$$\blacksquare Choose \rho = t_1^* t_2^*$$

■ But  $\mathcal{R}^*|_{[c..\infty[^2} \not\subseteq \mathcal{R}(\rho) \quad \text{(for all } c \in \mathbb{N}\text{)}$ ■  $(q, (c, c)) \xrightarrow{*} (q, (4c, 4c))$ 

■ ρ is not "straight enough"

- zigzag-free LPS:  $\rho = \sigma_0 \theta_1^* \sigma_1 \cdots \theta_k^* \sigma_k$  with  $\delta(\theta_i)$  in the same quadrant
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Straighten 
$$\rho = t_1^* t_2^*$$
 into:

$$\rho' = \underbrace{\{(0,0),(1,1),(2,2)\}}_{\{(\varepsilon+t_1t_2+(t_1t_2)^2)} \cdot \underbrace{(0,3)^*}_{(t_1t_2^2)^*} \cdot \underbrace{(3,0)^*}_{(t_1^2t_2)^*} + \underbrace{t_1^* \cdot (t_1^2t_2)^*}_{\{(2,-1),(3,0)\}^*} + \underbrace{t_2^* \cdot (t_1t_2^2)^*}_{\{(-1,2),(0,3)\}^*}$$

#### Ultimate flatness of 2-dim VASS

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**Proposition.** The restriction  $\mathcal{R}^*|_{[c \dots \infty]^2} \subseteq \mathcal{R}(\rho)$  is flat

### Flatness of 1-dim VASS

- $\blacksquare$  Simplification: assume that  $\delta: T \to \{-1,0,1\}^n$
- $\blacksquare$  I = [0 ... c] and  $I_{\infty} = [c ... \infty[$
- ${\scriptstyle \blacksquare} \ {\mathcal R}^*|_I$  and  ${\mathcal R}^*|_{I_\infty}$  are flat

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- Consider  $(q, x) \xrightarrow{*} (q', x')$  with  $x \leq c$  and x' > c

$$\underbrace{(q,x) \xrightarrow{*} (q_1,c)}_{\in \mathcal{R}^*|_I} \quad \text{and} \quad \underbrace{(q_1,c) \xrightarrow{*} (q',x')}_{\in \mathcal{R}^*|_{I_{\infty}}}$$

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Hence:

$$\mathcal{R}^* \subseteq \left(\mathcal{R}^*|_I \cup \mathcal{R}^*|_{I_\infty}\right)^2$$

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• 
$$I = [0 \dots c]$$
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- $\blacksquare \mathcal{R}^*|_{I \times I} \text{ and } \mathcal{R}^*|_{I_{\infty} \times I_{\infty}} \text{ are flat}$
- By reduction to 1-dim VASS,  $(\mathcal{R}|_{I \times \mathbb{N}})^*$  and  $(\mathcal{R}|_{\mathbb{N} \times I})^*$  are flat

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- By reduction to 1-dim VASS,  $(\mathcal{R}|_{I \times \mathbb{N}})^*$  and  $(\mathcal{R}|_{\mathbb{N} \times I})^*$  are flat
- $\blacksquare$  Decomposition of  $\mathcal{R}^*$  as for 1-dim VASS

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- $\mathcal{R}^*$ , post\* and pre\* computed with generic acceleration techniques
  - accelerated symbolic model checkers terminate on 2-dim VASS
- $\blacksquare$  Practical applications for the effective semilinearity of  $\mathcal{R}^*$  :
  - check relationships between input values and output values
  - replace some flat subsystems by semilinear meta-transitions
  - parameter synthesis
    - compute the set of initial states such that the counters stay bounded

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   accelerated symbolic model checkers terminate on 2-dim VASS

## Future work

- Investigate flatness of other decidable classes
- Better acceleration framework for Fifo systems

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
