2 Regular languages of finite trees

RANKED TREES

- rank: maximal arity of nodes (number of children)
- binary trees: rank ≤ 2 .
- Finite binary tree over alphabet Σ : partial mapping

$$t: \left\{0,1\right\}^* \to \Sigma$$

such that dom(t) is finite, prefix-closed and $x1 \in dom(t)$ implies $x0 \in dom(t)$, for all x. ϵ : root, 0,1: children of the root, etc.

BOTTOM-UP TREE AUTOMATA (NTA, TA)

An NTA (non-deterministic tree automaton) $\mathcal{A} = \langle S, \Sigma, \delta, F \rangle$ consists of

- \bullet a finite set of states S,
- a finite alphabet Σ ,
- a transition relation $\delta \subseteq S^{\leq 2} \times \Sigma \times S$ (we assume binary trees),
- a set of final states F.

An NTA is deterministic (denoted TA), if δ is a function $\delta: S^{\leq 2} \times \Sigma \to S$.

NTA ACCEPTANCE

• Let $\mathcal{A} = \langle S, \Sigma, \delta, F \rangle$ be an NTA. A run of \mathcal{A} on a binary tree t is a (partial) mapping

$$\rho:\{0,1\}^*\to S$$

with $dom(\rho) = dom(t)$ and

- **()** if $x \in \text{dom}(t)$ of rank 0 (leaf) then $(t(x), \rho(x)) \in \delta$,
- (2) if $x \in \text{dom}(t)$ of rank 1 then $(\rho(x0), t(x), \rho(x)) \in \delta$,
- $\textbf{ o if } x \in \mathsf{dom}(t) \text{ of rank 2 then } (\rho(x0), \rho(x1), t(x), \rho(x)) \in \delta.$
- A run ρ of \mathcal{A} on t is accepted if $\rho(\epsilon) \in F$.
- Accepted language $L(A) = \text{set of all finite binary trees having an accepting run of A.$

REGULAR LANGUAGES

A language of binary trees is regular if it is accepted by an NTA.

Properties of NTA

- NTA can be determinized.
- The family of regular languages of (binary) finite trees is a Boolean algebra.

TOP-DOWN TREE AUTOMATA

• A top-down tree automaton $\mathcal{A} = \langle S, \Sigma, I, \delta \rangle$ consists of a finite set of states S, a finite alphabet Σ , a set of initial states I and a transition relation

$$\delta \subseteq S \times \Sigma \times S^{\leq 2}$$

- Accepting run ρ : $\rho(\epsilon) \in I$ and $(\rho(x), t(x)) \in \delta$ for each leaf x.
- Deterministic top-down tree automaton: $\delta: S \times \Sigma \to S^{\leq 2}$.
- Non-deterministic tree top-down automata accept precisely regular tree languages.
- Top-down deterministic tree automata are strictly weaker than non-deterministic ones. Example: $L = \{c(a, b), c(b, a)\}.$

1 AUTOMATA ON FINITE TREES

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PRODUCT, ITERATION

- Let L, K be tree languages and a ∈ Σ. We define L ⋅a K as the set of trees of L where every a-labeled leaf is replaced by some element of K.
- Let L be a tree language and $a \in \Sigma$. We define inductively (for $k \ge 0$) :

$$L^{0,a} = \{a\}, \quad L^{k+1,a} = L^{k,a} \cdot_a L$$

•
$$L^{*,a} = \bigcup_{k \ge 0} L^{k,a}$$

REGULAR EXPRESSIONS

The set of regular expressions over trees is defined as the least set containing \emptyset and t (for every tree t), which is closed under union, \cdot_a and *,a (for all $a \in \Sigma$).

KLEENE-LIKE THEOREM

A language of trees is regular if and only if it is defined by a regular expression.

THATCHER & WRIGHT, DONER

A language of finite trees is regular if and only if it is definable in MSOL.

ANTICHAIN LOGIC (POTTHOFF, THOMAS)

- A subset of nodes in a tree is an an anti-chain if its elements are pairwise incomparable w.r.t. the descendant order.
- Anti-chain MSOL is the restriction of MSOL to set quantification over anti-chains.
- A language of proper binary, finite trees (without unary branching) is regular if and only if it is definable in anti-chain MSOL.
