The Asymmetric Simple Exclusion Process (ASEP)



- One dimensional lattice
- Exclusion: at most one particle per site
- Asymmetric: jump rate to the right $t^{\frac{1}{2}}$, to the left $t^{-\frac{1}{2}}$
- Particles enter with rate α from left, with rate δ from right
- \blacktriangleright Particles leave with rate γ from left, with rate β from right

Applications









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Impurities

Here we want to take into account the presence of impurities that are NOT EXCHANGED with the reservoirs



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Two species ASEP



The impurity (*second-class particle*) has the same dynamics as a normal (*first-class particle*), while the first-class particles treat it as a hole.

It is convenient to think at first class, second class particles and empty sites as *three kinds of particles*

Using a vector representation for the probabilities

$$\mathcal{P}_{N,m}(t) = \sum_{w \in \mathcal{Q}(N,m)} \mathcal{P}_w(t)w$$
Number of impurities

The Master equation reads

Length of the chain

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$$\frac{d}{dt}\mathcal{P}(t) = \mathcal{M}\mathcal{P}(t)$$

Where the Markov generator is given by the sum of local terms

$$\mathcal{M} = \sum_{i=1}^{N-1} \mathbf{e}_i + \mathbf{f}_1 + \mathbf{f}_N.$$

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Stationary measure

In this talk I'll focus on the Stationary measure

 $\mathcal{MP}_{N,m}=0$

- ► Usually dealt with by the Matrix Product Ansatz [Derrida, Evans, Hakim, Pasquier]
- Rich combinatorics: rhombic alternative and rhombic staircase tableaux [Corteel, Williams, Mandelshtam, Viennot,...]
- Boundary induced phase transitions [Krug,...]
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Exchange/reflection equations.

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$\widehat{\mathcal{C}}_N$ Hecke Algebra

Define operators T_0, T_1, \ldots, T_N as

$$T_0 = \alpha^{-\frac{1}{2}} \delta^{-\frac{1}{2}} \mathbf{f}_1 + \alpha^{\frac{1}{2}} \delta^{-\frac{1}{2}} \mathbf{1}$$
$$T_N = \beta^{-\frac{1}{2}} \gamma^{-\frac{1}{2}} \mathbf{f}_N + \beta^{\frac{1}{2}} \gamma^{-\frac{1}{2}} \mathbf{1}$$

and for $1 \leq i \leq N-1$

$$T_i = \mathbf{e}_i + t^{-\frac{1}{2}} \mathbf{1}$$

They satisfy the commutation relations of the generators of the affine Hecke algebra $\hat{\mathcal{C}}_N$

$$T_{i} - T_{i}^{-1} = t_{i}^{\frac{1}{2}} - t_{i}^{-\frac{1}{2}}$$

$$T_{i}T_{j} = T_{j}T_{i} \text{ if } |i-j| > 1$$

$$T_{i}T_{i+1}T_{i} = T_{i+1}T_{i}T_{i+1} \text{ if } i \neq 0, N-1$$

$$T_{0}T_{1}T_{0}T_{1} = T_{1}T_{0}T_{1}T_{0}$$

$$T_{N}T_{N-1}T_{N}T_{N-1} = T_{N-1}T_{N}T_{N-1}T_{N}$$
with $t_{0}^{\frac{1}{2}} = \alpha^{\frac{1}{2}}\delta^{-\frac{1}{2}}, t_{N}^{\frac{1}{2}} = \beta^{\frac{1}{2}}\gamma^{-\frac{1}{2}}$ and $t_{i} = t$ for $1 \leq i \leq N-1$.

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Integrability

The \check{R} matrices

$$\check{R}_i(z) = \mathbf{1} + \frac{z-1}{t^{\frac{1}{2}}z - t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}\mathbf{e}_i.$$

The boundary scattering matrices

$$K_1(z|a,b) = 1 + \frac{(z^2 - 1)}{(z - a)(z - b)} \delta^{-1} \mathbf{f}_1(\delta, \alpha),$$

$$K_N(z|c,d) = \mathbf{1} + \frac{(1-z^2)}{(cz-1)(dz-1)} \gamma^{-1} \mathbf{f}_N(\beta,\gamma)$$

Where we assume $t \neq 1$ and parametrize the boundary rates as

$$\alpha = \frac{\left(t^{\frac{1}{2}} - t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\right)ab}{(a-1)(b-1)}, \qquad \delta = \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}} - t^{\frac{1}{2}}}{(a-1)(b-1)}$$
$$\beta = \frac{\left(t^{\frac{1}{2}} - t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\right)cd}{(c-1)(d-1)}, \qquad \gamma = \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}} - t^{\frac{1}{2}}}{(c-1)(d-1)}$$

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We introduce a vector

$$\Psi_{N,m}(\mathsf{z}) = \sum_{w \in \mathcal{Q}(N,m)} \psi_w(\mathsf{z})w$$

solution of the following exchange/reflection equations

$$\begin{split} \check{R}_i(z_i z_{i+1}^{-1}) \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) &= \mathbf{s}_i \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) \\ \mathcal{K}_1(z_1) \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) &= \mathbf{s}_0 \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) \\ \mathcal{K}_N(z_N) \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) &= \mathbf{s}_N \Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}). \end{split}$$

where

$$\mathbf{s}_i f(\dots, z_i, z_{i+1}, \dots) = f(\dots, z_{i+1}, z_i, \dots)$$
$$\mathbf{s}_0 f(z_1, \dots) = f(z_1^{-1}, \dots)$$
$$\mathbf{s}_N f(\dots, z_N) = f(\dots, z_N^{-1})$$

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Consistency of the exchange/reflection equations is ensured by the Yang-Baxter equations

$$\check{R}_{i}(yz^{-1})\check{R}_{i+1}(xz^{-1})\check{R}_{i}(xy^{-1}) = \check{R}_{i+1}(xy^{-1})\check{R}_{i}(xz^{-1})\check{R}_{i+1}(yz^{-1})$$

$$\check{K}_1(xy^{-1})K_1(y)\check{K}_1(x^{-1}y^{-1}))K_1(x) = K_1(x)\check{K}_1(x^{-1}y^{-1})K_1(y)\check{K}_1(xy^{-1}),$$

$$\check{R}_{N-1}(xy^{-1})K_N(x)\check{R}_{N-1}(xy)K_N(y) = K_N(y)\check{R}_{N-1}(xy)K_N(x)\check{R}_{N-1}(xy^{-1}),$$

and the so called unitarity condition

$$\check{R}_i(z)\check{R}_i(z^{-1}) = \mathbf{1}.$$

 $K_1(x)K_1(x^{-1}) = \mathbf{1}, \qquad K_N(x)K_N(x^{-1}) = \mathbf{1}.$

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Theorem

- The exchange equations have unique solution (up to multiplication by a function invariant under the action of s₀, s_i, s_N)
- Under specialization $z_i = 1$ we get

 $\Psi_{N,m}(\mathbf{1}) \propto \mathcal{P}_{N,m}$

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Exchange/reflection equations in components

$$\psi_{\dots,*}(\mathbf{z}) = \mathbf{s}_N\psi_{\dots,*}(\mathbf{z})$$

Affine Hecke Again: Noumi representation

Noumi introduced a representation of \widehat{C}_N depending on 6 parameters a, b, c, d, t, q, acting on $\mathbb{C}[z_1^{\pm 1}, \dots, z_N^{\pm 1}]$

$$\widehat{T}_{i} = t^{\frac{1}{2}} - (t^{\frac{1}{2}}z_{i} - t^{-\frac{1}{2}}z_{i+1}) \partial_{i}$$

$$\widehat{T}_{0} = t_{0}^{\frac{1}{2}} - t_{0}^{-\frac{1}{2}} \frac{(z_{1} - a)(z_{1} - b)}{z_{1}} \partial_{0}$$

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where $t_0 = -q^{-1}ab t_N = -cd$ and

$$\partial_i = \frac{1 - \mathbf{s}_i}{z_i - z_{i+1}}, \quad \partial_0 = \frac{1 - \mathbf{s}_0}{z_1 - \mathbf{q} z_1^{-1}}, \quad \partial_N = \frac{1 - \mathbf{s}_N}{z_N - z_N^{-1}}.$$

Where $\mathbf{s}_i, \mathbf{s}_N$ are as before but

$$\mathbf{s}_0 f(z_1,\ldots) = f(qz_1^{-1},\ldots)$$

For ASEP q = 1

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Non-symmetric Koornwinder

[Sahi, Noumi, ...]

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The commutative sub-algebra \mathcal{Y}_N generated by elements $Y_1^{\pm 1}, \ldots, Y_N^{\pm 1}$ [Lusztig]

$$Y_i = (T_i \ldots T_{N-1})(T_N \ldots T_0)(T_1^{-1} \ldots T_{i-1}^{-1}).$$

Its common eigenfunctions are the non-symmetric Koornwinder polynomials $E_{\alpha}(\mathbf{z})$ ($\alpha \in \mathbb{Z}^{N}$)

$$E_{\alpha}(\mathbf{z}) = \mathbf{z}^{\alpha} + \sum_{\mathbf{z}^{\beta} \prec \mathbf{z}^{\alpha}} c_{\beta} \mathbf{z}^{\beta},$$
$$\widehat{Y}_{i} E_{\alpha}(\mathbf{z}) = \omega_{i}(\alpha) E_{\alpha}(\mathbf{z}).$$

By using the exchange/reflection relations it is easy to show that

$$\psi_{\underbrace{\circ\cdots\circ}_{N-m}}\underbrace{\ast\cdots\ast}_{m}(z) = E_{\underbrace{-1\cdots-1}_{N-m}}\underbrace{0\cdots0}_{m}(z)$$

(Actually $E_{\underbrace{-1\cdots-1}_{N-m}} \underbrace{0\cdots0}_{m}$ (z) doesn't depend on q).

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$$\psi_{\underbrace{0,\ldots,0}_{N-m}}(\mathbf{z}) = E_{\underbrace{-1,\ldots,-1}_{N-m}}(\underbrace{0,\ldots,0}_{m}(\mathbf{z})$$
(Actually $E_{\underbrace{-1,\ldots,-1}_{N-m}}(\underbrace{0,\ldots,0}_{m}(\mathbf{z})$ doesn't depend on q).

Symmetric Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials [Koornwinder]

Koornwinder q-difference operator

$$\mathcal{D}_{q,t} = \sum_{i=1}^{N} \Phi_i(z_i) (T_{q,z_i} - 1) + \Phi_i(z_i^{-1}) (T_{q,z_i}^{-1} - 1)$$

where T_{q,z_i} is the *i*-th q-shif operator

$$T_{q,z_i}f(z_1,\ldots,z_i,\ldots,z_N)=f(z_1,\ldots,qz_i,\ldots,z_N)$$

and

$$\Phi_i(z) = rac{(1-az)(1-bz)(1-cz)(1-dz)}{(1-z^2)(1-qz^2)} \prod_{\substack{j=1\j
eq i}}^N rac{(1-tzz_j)(1-tzz_j^{-1})}{(1-zz_j)(1-zz_j^{-1})}$$

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The symmetric Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials $P_{\lambda}(\mathbf{z})$

- Laurent polynomials in N variables
- Labeled by a partition λ , coefficient of \mathbf{z}^{λ} in $P_{\lambda}(\mathbf{z})$ is 1

• Eigenfunctions of $\mathcal{D}_{q,t}$

$$\mathcal{D}_{q,t}P_{\lambda}(\mathbf{z}) = d_{\lambda}P_{\lambda}(\mathbf{z})$$

$$d_\lambda = \sum_{i=1}^N \left[q^{-1} abcdt^{2n-i-1}(q^{\lambda_i}-1)+t^{i-1}(q^{-\lambda_i}-1)
ight]$$

They are multivariables generalization of the Askey-Wilson polynomials

$$P_{\{m\}}(\mathbf{z}) \propto p_m(x; a, b, c, d|q).$$

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Orthogonality

$$\langle P_{\lambda}, P_{\mu} \rangle = 0 \quad \text{if} \quad \lambda \neq \mu.$$

 $\langle p, q \rangle := \oint_{\mathcal{C}} \prod_{j=1}^{N} \frac{dz_j}{4\pi i z_j} \Delta_N(t, q; \mathbf{z}) p(\mathbf{z}) q(\mathbf{z}^{-1})$

where the contour of integration C encircles the poles in aq^k, bq^k, cq^k, dq^k ($k \in \mathbb{Z}_+$) and excludes all the others.

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Weighted partition function

Let $\bullet(w)$ be the number of first class particles in configuration w. We define the *weighted partition function* as

$$Z_N(\xi; \mathbf{z}; \mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b}, \mathbf{c}, \mathbf{d}) := \sum_{w \in \mathcal{Q}(N,m)} \xi^{2 \bullet (w)} \psi_w(\mathbf{z}).$$

Theorem

The generating function for the number of particles in the system is given by

$$Z_{N,m}(\xi; \mathbf{z}; a, b, c, d) = \xi^{N-m} P_{1^{N-m}0^m}(\xi \mathbf{z} | \xi \mathbf{z}; a_{\xi}, b_{\xi}, c_{\xi}, d_{\xi})$$

with $a_{\xi} = \xi a, b_{\xi} = \xi b, c_{\xi} = \xi^{-1}c, d_{\xi} = \xi^{-1}d.$

Remark: the Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials $P_{1^{N-m}0^m}(z)$ associated to single column diagrams $\lambda = 1^{N-m}0^m$ are independent of the parameter q.

We define an inhomogenous version of the current of particles

$$J_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) := \frac{1}{Z_{N,m}(\xi = 1; \mathbf{z})} \sum_{w \in \mathcal{Q}(N,m)} \alpha \psi_{\circ w}(\mathbf{z}) - \gamma \psi_{\bullet w}(\mathbf{z}),$$

$$\langle J_{N,m}\rangle = J_{N,m}(\mathbf{1}).$$

Using the recursion relations we get

$$J_{N,m}(\mathbf{z}) = -\gamma \frac{(a-z_1)(b-z_1)}{z_1} \frac{Z_{N-1,m}(\mathbf{z} \setminus z_1)}{Z_{N,m}(\mathbf{z})}.$$

• After specialization z = 1, we obtain

$$\langle J_{N,m} \rangle = (t^{\frac{1}{2}} - t^{-\frac{1}{2}}) \frac{Z_{N-1,m}(\mathbf{1})}{Z_{N,m}(\mathbf{1})}.$$

► For the density of first class particles we have

$$\langle \rho_{N,m}^{\bullet} \rangle = \left(\frac{1}{2N} \frac{\partial}{\partial \xi} \log Z_{N,m}(\xi; \mathbf{1}) \right) \Big|_{\xi=0}$$

▶ In order to determine their asymptotic behavior $N \rightarrow \infty$, $\rho_* = m/N$, we use an integral representation of the Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials.

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Integral representation

Using the Cauchy identity for Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials [Mimachi] and assuming t < 1, we can write

$$Z_{N,m}(\xi; \mathbf{z}) = r_m^{-1}(a_{\xi}, b_{\xi}, c_{\xi}, d_{\xi}|t) \times \\ \xi^{N-m} \oint_{\mathcal{C}} \frac{dx}{4\pi i x} \Pi(\xi \mathbf{z}, x) w(x; a_{\xi}, b_{\xi}, c_{\xi}, d_{\xi}|t) p_m(x; a_{\xi}, b_{\xi}, c_{\xi}, d_{\xi}|t)$$

 $p_m(x; a, b, c, d|t)$ is the *m*-th Askey-Wilson polynomial of base *t* in the variable $\frac{x+x^{-1}}{2}$,

$$w(x; a, b, c, d|t) = \frac{(x^2, x^{-2}; t)_{\infty}}{(ax, ax^{-1}, bx, bx^{-1}, cx, cx^{-1}, dx, dx^{-1}; t)_{\infty}},$$

$$\Pi(\mathbf{z}, \mathbf{x}) = \prod_{1 \le i \le N} (z_i + z_i^{-1} - x - x^{-1})$$

 $r_m(a,b,c,d|t) = rac{(abcdt^{2m};t)_\infty}{(t^{m+1},abt^m,act^m,adt^m,bct^m,bdt^m,cdt^m;t)_\infty}.$

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Remarks

- ► This formula at z = 1 generalizes the result of Uchiyama, Sasamoto and Wadati obtained for m = 0.
- ► At z = 1 improves a much more complicated formula obtained by Uchiyama.
- Comparison with results of Corteel, Mandelshtam and Williams: combinatorial representations of P_w in terms of Rhombic Staircase Tableaux?

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Conclusion

- The approach to the study of the stationary measure through exchange relations can be applied to any Yang-Baxter integrable stochastic process.
- Relations with multivariate orthogonal polynomials.
- Work backward: find Matrix Product representations of Macdonald-Koornwinder polynomials.
- ▶ Work with several species of particles → general Koornwinder polynomials at q = 1.

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
