





# **Triangulations**




Every face has degree 3.


Loops and multiple edges are allowed.

#### Map enumeration

Let  $\mathcal{M}$  be a set of planar maps, and let m(n) be the number of maps of  $\mathcal{M}$  of size (= edge number) n.

ullet Objective: determine the sequence m(n)

$$m(n) = \cdots$$
 or  $M(t) := \sum_{n \ge 0} m(n)t^n = \sum_{M \in \mathcal{M}} t^{e(M)} = \cdots$ 

where M(t) is the generating function of  $\mathcal{M}$ .

• Multi-parameter enumeration:

$$m(n;k) = \cdots$$
 or  $M(t;x) := \sum_{n \ge 0} m(n;k)t^n x^k = \cdots$ 

#### **Examples**

• The generating function of planar maps, counted by edges, is

$$M(t) = \sum_{M} t^{e(M)} = \sum_{n>0} \frac{2 \cdot 3^n}{n(n+1)} {2n \choose n} t^n = \frac{(1-12t)^{3/2} - 1 + 18t}{54t^2}$$

[Tutte 60's]

#### **Examples**

• The generating function of planar maps, counted by edges, is

$$M(t) = \sum_{M} t^{e(M)} = \sum_{n \ge 0} \frac{2 \cdot 3^n}{n(n+1)} {2n \choose n} t^n = \frac{(1-12t)^{3/2} - 1 + 18t}{54t^2}$$

[Tutte 60's]

• The generating function of planar triangulations, counted by vertices, is

$$T(t) = \sum_{T} t^{\vee(T)} = \sum_{n>2} \frac{2 \cdot 4^{n-2} (3n-6)!!}{n!(n-2)!!} t^n$$

with  $k!! = k(k-2)(k-4)\cdots$ , and satisfies the cubic equation

$$64 T(t)^3 + (1 - 96 t) T(t)^2 - t (1 - 30 t) T(t) + t^3 (1 - 27 t) = 0$$

#### The Potts model on planar maps

• Count all q-colourings of some family  $\mathcal{M}$  of planar maps, keeping track of the number m(M) of monochromatic edges:

$$M(q, \nu, t) := \sum_{\substack{M \text{ } q\text{-coloured}}} t^{e(M)} \nu^{m(M)}$$

The Potts generating function of maps.

• In other words,

$$M(q, \nu, t) = \sum_{M} \mathsf{Z}_{M}(q, \nu) t^{\mathsf{e}(M)}$$

where

$$Z_M(q,\nu) = \sum_{c:V(M)\to\{1,2,...,q\}} \nu^{m(c)}$$

is the Potts partition function of M.

Example: When M has one edge and two vertices,  $Z_M(q,\nu)=q\nu+q(q-1)$ 

#### The Potts model on planar maps

• Count all q-colourings of some family  $\mathcal{M}$  of planar maps, keeping track of the number m(M) of monochromatic edges:

$$M(q, \nu, t) := \sum_{\substack{M \ q-\text{coloured}}} t^{e(M)} \nu^{m(M)}$$

The Potts generating function of maps.

• In particular,

$$M(q,0,t) := \sum_{\substack{M \text{ } q-\text{prop. coloured}}} t^{\operatorname{e}(M)} = \sum_{M} \chi_M(q) t^{\operatorname{e}(M)}$$

counts properly coloured maps.

#### The Potts model on planar maps

• Count all q-colourings of some family  $\mathcal{M}$  of planar maps, keeping track of the number m(M) of monochromatic edges:

$$M(q, \nu, t) := \sum_{\substack{M \ q-\text{coloured}}} t^{e(M)} \nu^{m(M)}$$

The Potts generating function of maps.

• Equivalently, find

$$\sum_{M \in \mathcal{M}} T_M(x, y) \ t^{e(M)} = \cdots$$

where  $T_M(x,y)$  is the Tutte polynomial of M. Connection:


$$(x-1)(y-1)^{\vee(M)}T_M(x,y) = \sum_{q-\text{colourings of } M} \nu^{m(M)}$$

with q = (x - 1)(y - 1) and  $\nu = y - 1$ .

#### Three approaches for counting maps

- [Tutte 60's]: recursive description of maps
- ⇒ functional equations for the GF

• [Schaeffer 97]: bijections with trees



• [Brézin-Itzykson-Parisi-Zuber 78]: matrix integrals

$$\lim_{N\to\infty} \frac{1}{N^2} \log \int dH e^{N \operatorname{tr} \left( -\frac{H^2}{2} + t \frac{H^3}{3} \right)}.$$

H: hermitian  $N \times N$  matrix

# I.1. Uncoloured enumeration: the recursive approach

#### Planar maps (tend to) have algebraic generating functions

 $M(t_1,\ldots,t_k)$  map GF: there exists a polynomial Q such that

$$Q(t_1, \ldots, t_k; M(t_1, \ldots, t_k)) = 0.$$

#### Example:

$$M(t) = \frac{(1-12t)^{3/2} - 1 + 18t}{54t^2} \quad \Rightarrow \quad \left(54t^2M(t) + 1 - 18t\right)^2 = (1-12t)^3$$



Let

$$F(t;y) \equiv F(y) = \sum_{M} t^{e(M)} y^{dv(M)} = \sum_{d \ge 0} F_d(t) y^d$$

where e(M) is the number of edges and dv(M) the degree of the root vertex.



The same equation... (duality)

#### Polynomial equations with one catalytic variable

#### Examples:

$$F(x) = 1 + tx^{2}F(x)^{2} + tx\frac{xF(x) - F(1)}{x - 1}$$

$$F(x) = 1 + txF(x)^{3} + tx(2F(x) + F(1))\frac{F(x) - F(1)}{x - 1} + tx\frac{F(x) - F(1) - (x - 1)F'(1)}{(x - 1)^{2}}$$

#### Solution:

- Guess and check [Tutte 60's]
- Brown's quadratic method [Brown 65]
- A generalization to all polynomial equations with one catalytic variable [mbm-Jehanne 06]

#### Polynomial equations with one catalytic variable

General framework: A polynomial equation:

$$P(F(x), F_1, \dots, F_m, t, x) = 0$$
 (1)

where  $F(x) \equiv F(t;x)$  is a series in t with polynomial coefficients in x, and  $F_i \equiv F_i(t)$  does not depend on x.

#### Results

- 1. The solution of every proper equation of this type is algebraic: There exists Q such that Q(t, x, F(t; x)) = 0.
- 2. A practical (but heavy) strategy allows to solve specific examples (that is, to derive from (1) an algebraic equation for F(x), or  $F_1, \ldots, F_m$ ).

#### **Example**

with two lines of Maple.

Equivalently,

$$F(t; 1) = A(t) - tA(t)^3$$
 where  $A(t) = 1 + 3tA(t)^2$ 


⇒ Many map families have an algebraic generating function

# I.2. Uncoloured enumeration: bijections

The algebraicity of planar maps generating functions can be explained via bijections with plane trees

#### Algebraic series count plane trees


Algebraic series usually arise from tree enumeration:




Are there correspondences between maps and trees?

#### Four-valent maps: a proof from The Book?

• Bijection between 4-valent planar maps (n vertices) and balanced blossoming trees (n nodes) [Schaeffer 97]








































## Bijections between maps and trees...

- Improve our understanding of the nature of planar maps
- $\bullet$  Lead to new results, e.g. on the geometry of random planar maps. For instance, the average diameter of a random map of size n scales like  $n^{1/4}$  [Chassaing-Schaeffer 02]



• These bijections are the starting point of many recent results in probability theory on the asymptotic properties of large random maps [Le Gall, Miermont, Marckert, Paulin...]

# II.1. Coloured enumeration: the recursive approach

(joint work with Olivier Bernardi)

$$M(q, \nu, t) := \sum_{\substack{M \ q-\text{coloured}}} t^{e(M)} \nu^{m(M)}$$

• Other approaches: [Eynard-Bonnet 99], [Guionnet et al. 10]

## Forget algebraicity!

Theorem [Tutte 73]: For planar triangulations,

$$\sum_{T} \chi'_{T}(1) t^{\vee(T)} = \sum_{n} (-1)^{n} b(n) t^{n+2}$$

where

$$b(n) = \frac{2(3n)!}{n!(n+1)!(n+2)!} \sim 27^n n^{-4},$$

and this asymptotic behaviour prevents the series  $B(t) := \sum b_n t^n$  from being algebraic.

However, it satisfies a linear differential equation.

#### WHY IS THAT SO?

• The recursive description of the Potts partition function

$$\mathsf{Z}_{G}(q,\nu) = \mathsf{Z}_{G \setminus e}(q,\nu) + (\nu - 1) \, \mathsf{Z}_{G/e}(q,\nu)$$

calls for a recursive description of maps by contraction and deletion of edges.

• This is possible if one keeps track of the degree of the outer face, and the degree of the root-vertex.

## **Equations with two catalytic variables**

Let

$$M(x,y) \equiv M(q,\nu,t;x,y) = \frac{1}{q} \sum_{M} \mathsf{Z}_{M}(q,\nu) t^{\mathsf{e}(M)} x^{\mathsf{dv}(M)} y^{\mathsf{df}(M)},$$

where dv(M) (resp. df(M)) is the degree of the root-vertex (resp. root-face).

• The Potts generating function of planar maps satisfies:

$$M(x,y) = 1 + xyt((\nu - 1)(y - 1) + qy) M(x,y) M(1,y) + xyzt(x\nu - 1)M(x,y)M(x,1) + xyt(\nu - 1)\frac{xM(x,y) - M(1,y)}{x-1} + xyzt\frac{yM(x,y) - M(x,1)}{y-1}.$$

[Tutte 68]

This equation has been sleeping for 40 years

## In the footsteps of W. Tutte

• For the GF  $T(q,t;x,y) \equiv T(x,y)$  of properly q-coloured triangulations:

$$T(x,y) = xy^{2}q(q-1) + \frac{xt}{yq}T(1,y)T(x,y) + xt\frac{T(x,y) - y^{2}T_{2}(x)}{y} - x^{2}yt\frac{T(x,y) - T(1,y)}{x-1}$$

where  $T_2(x)$  is the coefficient of  $y^2$  in T(x,y).

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## Theorem [Tutte]

- For  $q=2+2\cos\frac{2\pi}{m}$ ,  $q\neq 4$ , the series  $T(1,y)\equiv T(t;1,y)$  satisfies a polynomial equation with one catalytic variable y.
- ullet When q is generic, the generating function of properly q-coloured planar triangulations is differentially algebraic:

$$2q^2(1-q)t + (qt+10H-6tH')H'' + q(4-q)(20H-18tH'+9t^2H'') = 0$$
 with  $H(t) = t^2T_2(q, \sqrt{t}; 1)/q$ .

#### Our results

• Let  $M(q, \nu, t; x, y)$  be the Potts generating function of planar maps:

$$M(x,y) \equiv M(q,\nu,t;x,y) = \frac{1}{q} \sum_{M} \mathsf{Z}_{M}(q,\nu) t^{\mathsf{e}(M)} x^{\mathsf{d}\mathsf{v}(M)} y^{\mathsf{d}\mathsf{f}(M)},$$

where dv(M) (resp. df(M)) is the degree of the root-vertex (resp. root-face).

#### **Theorem**

- For  $q=2+2\cos\frac{j\pi}{m}$ ,  $q\neq 0,4$ , the series  $M(q,\nu,t;1,y)\equiv M(1,y)$  satisfies a polynomial equation with one catalytic variable y, and the complete Potts generating function  $M(q,\nu,t;x,y)$  is algebraic.
- When q is generic,  $M(q, \nu, t; 1, 1)$  is differentially algebraic:

## Example: The Ising model on planar maps (q = 2)

Let A be the series in t, with polynomial coefficients in  $\nu$ , defined by

$$A = t \frac{\left(1 + 3\nu A - 3\nu A^2 - \nu^2 A^3\right)^2}{1 - 2A + 2\nu^2 A^3 - \nu^2 A^4}.$$

Then the Ising generating function of planar maps is

$$M(2, \nu, t; 1, 1) = \frac{1 + 3\nu A - 3\nu A^2 - \nu^2 A^3}{\left(1 - 2A + 2\nu^2 A^3 - \nu^2 A^4\right)^2} P(\nu, A)$$

where

$$P(\nu, A) = \nu^3 A^6 + 2\nu^2 (1 - \nu) A^5 + \nu (1 - 6\nu) A^4 - \nu (1 - 5\nu) A^3 + (1 + 2\nu) A^2 - (3 + \nu) A + 1.$$

 $\rightarrow$  Asymptotics: Phase transition at  $\nu_c = \frac{3+\sqrt{5}}{2}$ , critical exponents...

## Example: properly 3-coloured planar maps ( $q = 3, \nu = 0$ )


Let A be the quartic series in t defined by

$$A = t \; \frac{(1+2A)^3}{(1-2A^3)}.$$

Then the generating function of properly 3-coloured planar maps is

$$M(3,0,t;1,1) = \frac{(1+2A)(1-2A^2-4A^3-4A^4)}{(1-2A^3)^2}$$

 $\rightarrow$  Asymptotics: A random loopless planar map with n edges has approximately  $(1.42...)^n$  proper 3-colourings



## Our results: when q is generic

• Let  $M(q, \nu, t; x, y)$  be the Potts generating function of planar maps:

$$M(x,y) \equiv M(q,\nu,t;x,y) = \frac{1}{q} \sum_{M} \mathsf{Z}_{M}(q,\nu) t^{\mathsf{e}(M)} x^{\mathsf{d}\mathsf{v}(M)} y^{\mathsf{d}\mathsf{f}(M)},$$

where dv(M) (resp. df(M)) is the degree of the root-vertex (resp. root-face).

#### **Theorem**

## An explicit system of differential equations

Let 
$$D(t,v) = q\nu + (\nu - 1)^2 - q(\nu + 1)v + (q + t(\nu - 1)(q - 4)(q + \nu - 1))v^2$$
.

• There exists a unique 8-tuple  $(P_1(t), \dots, P_4(t), Q_1(t), Q_2(t), R_1(t), R_2(t))$  of series in t with polynomial coefficients in q and  $\nu$  such that

$$\frac{1}{v^2 R} \frac{\partial}{\partial v} \left( \frac{v^4 R^2}{P D^2} \right) = \frac{1}{Q} \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left( \frac{Q^2}{P D^2} \right),$$

where

$$P(t,v) = P_4(t)v^4 + P_3(t)v^3 + P_2(t)v^2 + P_1(t)v + 1,$$
  

$$Q(t,v) = Q_2(t)v^2 + Q_1(t)v + 1,$$
  

$$R(t,v) = R_2(t)v^2 + R_1(t)v + q + \nu - 3,$$

with the initial conditions (at t = 0):

$$P(0,v) = (1-v)^2$$
 and  $Q(0,v) = 1-v$ .

## An explicit system of differential equations (cont'd)

ullet The Potts generating function of planar maps,  $M(1,1)\equiv M(q,\nu,t;1,1)$ , satisfies

$$12t^{2}(q\nu + (\nu - 1)^{2})M(q, \nu, t; 1, 1) =$$

$$8t(q+\nu-3)Q_{1}(t)-Q_{1}(t)^{2}+P_{2}(t)-2Q_{2}(t)-4t(2-3\nu-q)-12t^{2}(q+\nu-3)^{2}.$$

### Questions

1. Use the structure of

$$\frac{1}{v^2 R} \frac{\partial}{\partial v} \left( \frac{v^4 R^2}{P D^2} \right) = \frac{1}{Q} \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left( \frac{Q^2}{P D^2} \right),$$

$$D(t,v) = q\nu^2 + (\nu - 1)(4(\nu - 1) + q)v + (q\nu(\nu - 1)(q - 4)t + (\nu - 1)^2)v^2$$
.

• There exists a unique 7-tuple  $(P_1(t), \dots, P_3(t), Q_1(t), Q_2(t), R_0(t), R_1(t))$  of series in t with polynomial coefficients in q and  $\nu$  such that

$$\frac{1}{v^2R} \frac{\partial}{\partial v} \left( \frac{v^5R^2}{PD^2} \right) = \frac{1}{Q} \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left( \frac{Q^2}{PD^2} \right),$$

where

$$P(t,v) = P_3(t)v^3 + P_2(t)v^2 + P_1(t)v + 1,$$
  

$$Q(t,v) = Q_2(t)v^2 + Q_1(t)v + 2\nu,$$
  

$$R(t,v) = R_1(t)v + R_0(t),$$

with the initial conditions (at t = 0):

$$P(0,v) = 1 + v/4$$
 and  $Q(0,v) = 2\nu + v$ .

ullet Expression of the Potts GF of triangulations in terms of the  $P_i$  and  $Q_i$ 

## ... and for properly *q*-coloured triangulations ( $\nu = 0$ )

Let 
$$D(v) = v + 4 - q$$
.

• There exists a unique 4-tuple  $(P_1, P_2, P_3, Q_1)$  of zeries in t with polynomial coefficients in q such that

$$-\frac{4t}{v} \frac{\partial}{\partial v} \left( \frac{v^3}{P} \right) = \frac{1}{Q} \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left( \frac{Q^2}{PD} \right).$$

where

$$P(t,v) = P_3(t)v^3 + P_2(t) + P_1(t)v + 1,$$
  
 $Q(t,v) = Q_1(t)v + 1,$ 

with the initial conditions (at t = 0):

$$P(0,v) = 1 + v/4$$
 and  $Q(0,v) = 1$ .

• From the system, one can derive Tutte's differential equation,


$$2q^{2}(1-q)t + (qt+10H-6tH')H'' + q(4-q)(20H-18tH'+9t^{2}H'') = 0$$
 with  $H(t) = t^{2}T_{2}(q, \sqrt{t}; 1)/q$ .

# II.2. Coloured enumeration: bijections?


Some bijections exist in special cases... but most remain to be found

## Some existing bijections

ullet Maps equipped with a spanning tree  $(\mathsf{T}_M(1,1))$  [Mullin 67], [Bernardi 07]





• Maps equipped with a bipolar orientation  $((-1)^{V(M)}\chi_M'(1))$  [Felsner-Fusy-Noy-Orden 08], [Fusy-Poulalhon-Schaeffer 08],




• The Ising model on planar maps (case q=2) [MBM-Schaeffer 02], [Bouttier et al.]

[Bonichon-mbm-Fusy 08]







n edges, k+1 vertices ( $\Rightarrow k$  edges in the tree)



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A shuffle of two plane trees

$$\binom{2n}{2k}C_kC_{n-k}$$

with  $C_k = {2k \choose k}/(k+1)$  counts rooted trees with k edges.

## Many questions are left...

#### A. More combinatorics

• Understand algebraic series, e.g., for 3-coloured planar maps:

$$M(3,0,t;1,1) = \frac{(1+2A)(1-2A^2-4A^3-4A^4)}{(1-2A^3)^2} \quad \text{with} \quad A = t\frac{(1+2A)^3}{(1-2A^3)}$$

• Understand differential equations, e.g., for properly q-coloured triangulations:

$$2q^{2}(1-q)t + (qt + 10H - 6tH')H'' + q(4-q)(20H - 18tH' + 9t^{2}H'') = 0$$

#### B. Equations with two catalytic variables

- Elimination in the systems of differential equations
