#### Exercise 1

Build a connected 5-degenerate graph that has all of its vertices but one of degree at least 6 and is not 5-colorable.

## Exercise 2

Build by induction for all integer k a tree  $T_k$ , together with an ordering of the vertices of  $T_k$ , such that applying the greedy algorithm on  $T_k$  with the vertices in this order gives a k-coloring of  $T_k$ .

#### Exercise 3

Show that a graph is k-degenerate if and only if there exists an order of the vertices of the graph such that every vertex has at most k neighbors before it in the order.

#### Exercise 4

For each of the following statements, either prove it or give a counter-example.

- 1. For every graph G, if given the right order, one can find a  $\chi(G)$ -coloring of G with a greedy algorithm.
- 2. For every graph class  $\mathcal{C}$  and every integer k, the complexity of deciding if a graph  $G \in \mathcal{C}$  is k-colorable is the same as the complexity of finding a k-coloring of G.

#### Exercise 5

Guive a class of graph where the coloring number can be arbitrarily large, but is bounded by a function of the clique number.

## Exercise 6

Give a  $O(n^2)$ -algorithm to 3-color an outerplanar graph.

# Exercise 7

Show that for every triangle-free planar graph G, V(G) can be partitioned into two sets, such that there is no cycle with every vertex in the same set.

## Exercise 8

Give a  $O(n^2)$ -algorithm to construct such a partition.
