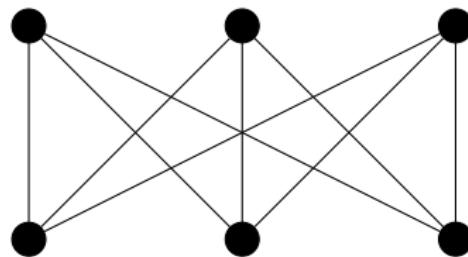

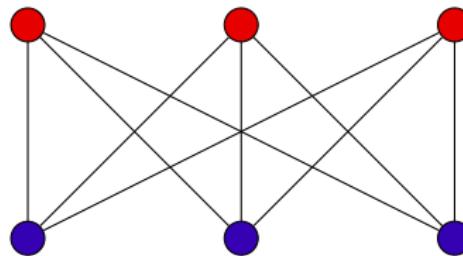

Vertex coloring



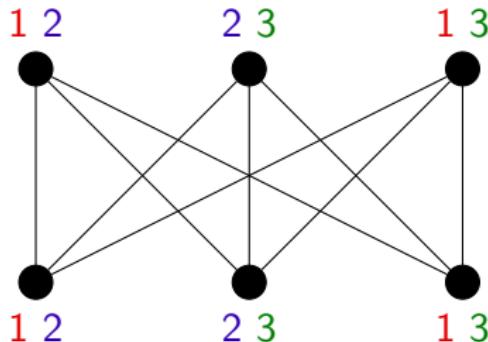
Vertex coloring



χ : Minimum number of colors to ensure that

$$\textcircled{a} \text{---} \textcircled{b} \Rightarrow a \neq b.$$

Vertex coloring



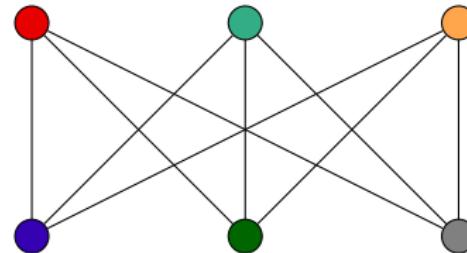
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$$\textcircled{a} - \textcircled{b} \Rightarrow a \neq b.$$

χ_L : Minimum size of every $L(v)$ such that

$$\textcircled{a} - \textcircled{b} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} a \neq b \\ a \in L(x) \\ b \in L(y) \end{cases}$$

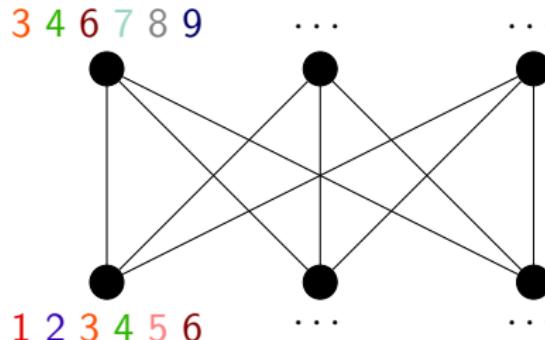
Square coloring



χ^2 : Minimum number of colors to ensure that

$$(a) \text{---} (b) \text{ or } (a) \text{---} (\text{empty circle}) \text{---} (b) \Rightarrow a \neq b.$$

Square coloring



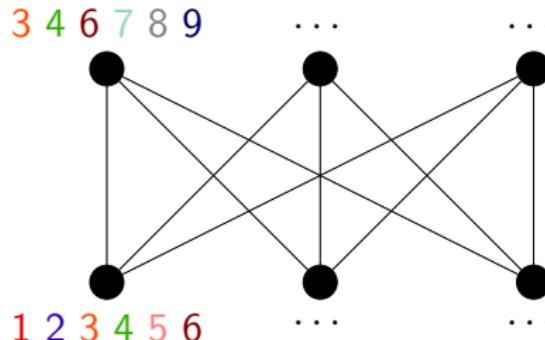
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χ_ℓ^2 : Minimum size of every $L(v)$ such that

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$$(a) \text{---} (b) \text{ or } (a) \text{---} (\circ) \text{---} (b) \xrightarrow{x \quad y \quad x \quad y} \begin{cases} a \neq b \\ a \in L(x) \\ b \in L(y) \end{cases}$$

$$\boxed{\Delta + 1 \leq \chi^2 \leq \chi_\ell^2 \leq \Delta^2 + 1}$$

Two conjectures

Conjecture (Kostochka, Woodall '01)

$$\chi^2 = \chi_\ell^2.$$

Planar graph \Leftrightarrow can be drawn in a plane without crossing edges.

Conjecture (Wegner 1977)

For planar graphs, $\chi^2 \leq \lfloor \frac{3\Delta}{2} \rfloor + 1$ if $\Delta \geq 8$.

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Recently disproved (Kim, Park '13)

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- $\exists (G_n)_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$, planar, $g = 6$, $\Delta \nearrow$, $\chi^2 > \Delta + 1$.

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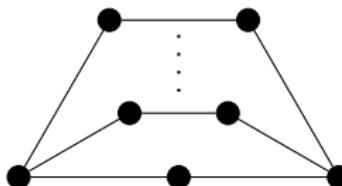
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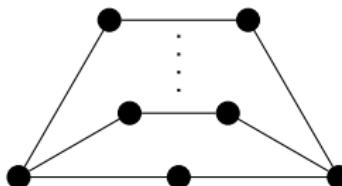
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For *planar* graphs:

- $g \geq 7 \Rightarrow \text{mad} < \frac{14}{5}$.
- $g \geq 6 \Rightarrow \text{mad} < 3$.

Mad and list square coloring

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For any graph, $\text{mad} < m$, $\Delta \geq d \Rightarrow \chi_\ell^2 = \Delta + 1$.

Answer: True for any $m < 3$.

- $\forall \epsilon > 0$, $\text{mad} < 3 - \epsilon$, $\Delta \geq \mathcal{O}(\frac{1}{\epsilon^2}) \Rightarrow \chi_\ell^2 = \Delta + 1$.
- $\exists (G_n)_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$, $\text{mad} < 3$, $\Delta \nearrow$, $\chi_\ell^2 > \Delta + 1$.

Key idea in the proof

Theorem

For a small enough ϵ , $\text{mad} < 3 - \epsilon$ and $\Delta \geq \frac{3}{\epsilon^2} \Rightarrow \chi_\ell^2 = \Delta + 1$.

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For any bipartite multigraph G , if L is an edge list assignment such that $|L(u, v)| \geq d(u), d(v)$ for every (u, v) , then G is L -edge-choosable.

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⇒ Global discharging method.

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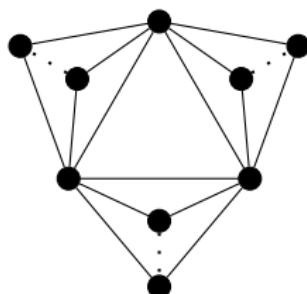
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$$\begin{aligned} \text{mad} &= \\ 4 - \frac{4}{\Delta} &. \\ \chi_\ell^2 &= \frac{3\Delta}{2}. \end{aligned}$$

Optimal theorem
 $M = 4$

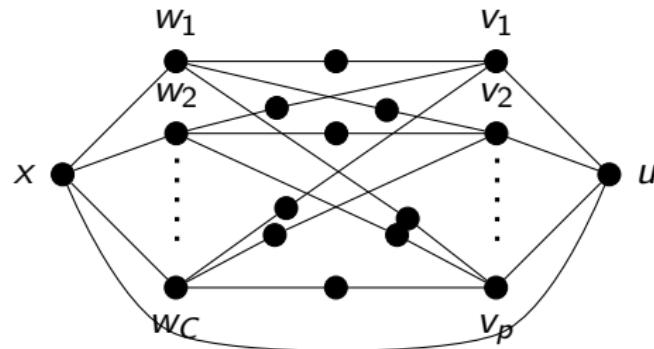
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Conjecture

For any C and $\epsilon > 0$,

$$\text{mad} < \frac{4C+2}{C+1} - \epsilon \text{ and } \Delta \geq f(C, \epsilon) \Rightarrow \chi_\ell^2 \leq \Delta + C.$$

$$\begin{aligned} C = 1 &\rightsquigarrow 3 \\ C = 2 &\rightsquigarrow \frac{10}{3} \\ \dots \\ C = +\infty &\rightsquigarrow 4 \end{aligned}$$



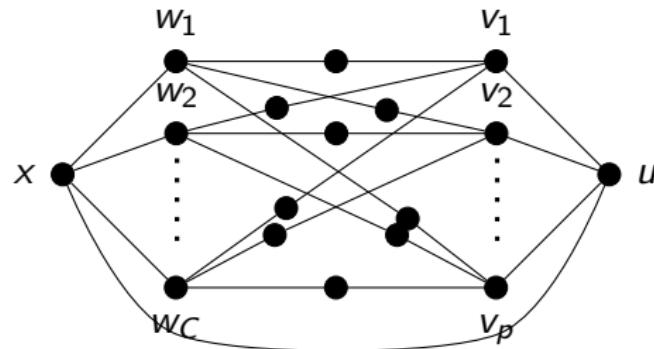
