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1 Introduction

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VAS

$$\begin{array}{lcl} \mathbf{A} & = & \{(-1, 2), (2, -1)\} \\ \mathbf{c}_{\text{init}} & = & (1, 1) \end{array} \quad \xrightarrow{\begin{matrix} (-1, 2) \\ (1, 1) \end{matrix}} \begin{matrix} \nearrow \\ \cup \\ \searrow \end{matrix} \quad (2, -1)$$

A trace is a sequence $\mathbf{a}_1, \dots, \mathbf{a}_n$ such that:

$$\forall i \leq n, \mathbf{c}_{\text{init}} + \mathbf{a}_1 + \dots + \mathbf{a}_i \geq 0$$

VAS

$$\begin{array}{ll} \mathbf{A} & = \{(-1, 2), (2, -1)\} \\ \mathbf{c}_{\text{init}} & = (1, 1) \end{array} \quad \begin{array}{c} (-1, 2) \\ \nearrow \\ (1, 1) \\ \searrow \\ (2, -1) \end{array}$$

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$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} \vdots & (-1, 2) & \vdots & (2, -1) & \vdots & (2, -1) & \vdots \\ (1, 1) & & (0, 3) & & (2, 2) & & (4, 1) \end{array} \quad \text{is a trace}$$

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} \vdots & (-1, 2) & (2, -1) & \vdots & (-1, 2) & (-1, 2) & \vdots & (-1, 2) & \vdots \\ (1, 1) & & (2, 2) & & (0, 6) & (0, 6) & & (-1, 8) & \vdots \end{array} \quad \text{is not a trace}$$

Many decidable problems:

- Coverability [Karp and Miller 69]
- Reachability [Mayr 81, Kosaraju 82]
- Regularity of trace languages [Ginzburg and Yoeli 80, Valk and Vidal-Naquet 81]
- Context-freeness of trace languages [Schwer 92]

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 - ▶ intricate proof with flaws

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Idea

- Stack: store the value of the counters
- Positive vector \Rightarrow Push it onto the stack
- Non-positive vector \Rightarrow Match it with the stack
- Problem: some components may be lost

Example

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \mathbf{a} = (1, 1) & \mathbf{b} = (1, 0) & \mathbf{c} = (-1, -1) \\ \textcircled{\text{(0, 0)}} & \textcircled{\text{(0, 0)}} & \textcircled{\text{(0, 0)}} \\ \xrightarrow{\hspace{2cm}} \cdot & \xrightarrow{\hspace{2cm}} \cdot & \xrightarrow{\hspace{2cm}} \cdot \end{array}$$

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It is context-free.

$$L = \{ \mathbf{a}^n \mathbf{b}^m \mathbf{c}^p \mid n \geq p \wedge m \geq 0 \}$$

Example

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \mathbf{a} = (0, 1) & \mathbf{b} = (1, 0) & \mathbf{c} = (-1, -1) \\ \text{\#/\!/N\!/N\!/} & & \\ (0, 0) \xrightarrow{\quad} \cdot & (0, 0) \xrightarrow{\quad} \cdot & (0, 0) \xrightarrow{\quad} \cdot \end{array}$$



It is not context-free.

$$L = \{a^n b^m c^p \mid n \geq p \wedge m \geq p \wedge \cancel{\text{H}}/\cancel{\text{H}}/\emptyset\}$$



It is context-free.

It is not context-free.

$$\begin{aligned} L \cap (ab)^*a^*b^* \\ = \\ \{(ab)^n a^m b^p \mid n+1 \geq m \wedge n+1+2m \geq p\} \end{aligned}$$

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Vector Pushdown Automata

A vector pushdown automaton (VPDA) contains:

- A set of states Q
- A counter vector $\mathbf{r} \in \mathbb{Q}_{\geq 0}^d$
- A **stack** containing vectors in $\mathbb{Q}_{\geq 0}^d$
- A set of transitions T :
 - ▶ actions on **stack**: push and pop
 - ▶ addition of positive vectors to \mathbf{r}
 - ▶ tests: boolean combinations of

$$\mathbf{r}(i) + \Delta(\text{stack})(i) \# z \quad \mathbf{r}(i) \# z$$

where $\# \in \{\leq, \geq\}$

Proposition

The language of a VPDA with finitely many states and transitions is context-free

Idea:

Finite set of transitions

⇒ Finite set of tests, finite stack alphabet

⇒ Above a given value of r and $\Delta(\text{stack})$, a test is always satisfied (or not)


⇒ We can abstract their values and encode r is the states and $\Delta(\text{stack})$ in stack

Match and Remainder

$u \geq 0$, $v \not\geq 0$, and λ the greatest rational such that $u + \lambda v \geq 0$,

$$\text{mat}(u, v) = \begin{cases} (1 - \lambda) \cdot v & \text{if } \lambda < 1 \\ (1 - \frac{1}{\lambda}) \cdot u & \text{if } \lambda \geq 1 \end{cases}$$

$$\text{rem}(u, v) = u + v - \text{mat}(u, v) \geq 0$$



Match and Remainder: Example with $\lambda < 1$

Take $u = (1, 2, 1)$ and $v = (-1, -3, 2)$

The greatest λ such that $u + \lambda v \geq 0$ is $\lambda = \frac{2}{3}$


After matching u and v , we are left with

$$\text{mat}(u, v) = (1 - \lambda) \cdot v = \left(-\frac{1}{3}, -1, \frac{2}{3}\right)$$



The remainder is

$$\text{rem}(u, v) = u + \lambda v = \left(\frac{1}{3}, 0, \frac{7}{3}\right)$$




From VAS to VPDA: Properties

Proposition

The constructed VPDA has a finite set of states and transitions

Proposition

If fail is not reachable, the VPDA recognises the same language as the VAS

Corollary

If fail is not reachable, the VAS is context-free

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Witnesses of Non-Context-Freeness

(2, 0) (2, 2) (0, 1) (-2, -1) (-1, -1)

Definition

A witness of non-context-freeness is a tuple $(\sigma_1, \dots, \sigma_k, U)$ such that:

- $\sigma_1 \cdots \sigma_k$ is a trace

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
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


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


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


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


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- $\forall (s, t) \in U, \text{ with } t < k,$
 $\exists s' \leq s, (s', t) \in U \wedge \forall i, \sigma_t(i) < 0 \rightarrow \sigma_{s'}(i) > 0$

Witnesses of Non-Context-Freeness




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

- $\forall i, \sigma_k(i) > 0 \rightarrow \exists (s, t) \in U, \text{rem}(\sigma_s, \sigma_t)(i) > 0$

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Witnesses and Vector Pushdown Automata

Proposition

If a VAS admits a witness of non-context-freeness, it is not context free

Proof based on Ginsburg characterisation of bounded context-free languages

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
Proposition

If fail is reachable in the vector pushdown automaton of a VAS, it admits a witness of non-context-freeness


Corollary

If fail is reachable in the vector pushdown automaton of a VAS, it is not context-free



Conclusion

- Simpler characterisation of context-freeness:

Theorem 5.1. Let $A = (T, \varphi, \alpha)$ be a k -VAS and $L(A)$ be its associated language. Let $\mathcal{C}(A) = \langle T, Q, \delta, \alpha \rangle$ be its covering automaton. $L(A)$ is context-free if and only if the following conditions hold:

- (P1) For every iterating system $\mathcal{S} = (x_0, q_1, u_1, x_1, q_2, \dots, x_{p-1}, q_p, u_p, x_p, q)$ related to an elementary loop (q, u) , $C1(\mathcal{S}, (q, u))$ is satisfied.
(P2) For no $(q, v), (q', v')$ in ϵ^- , $(p, u), (p', u')$ in ϵ^+ $C2((p, u), (p', u'), (q, v), (q', v'))$ is satisfied.
(P3) For all classes $[i]$ of states $C3(\text{label}(\mathcal{W}_i))$ and $C3(\text{label}(\mathcal{X}_i))$ are satisfied.
(P4) For all $j \in [1, m]$, the set $W = W_{I^*(j)}$ satisfies $C4(W)$.
(P5) For all $j \in [1, m]$, if $W_{I^*(j)}$ has a dominating coordinate, then there is one in $ZERO(j)$.

Definition 4.5. Let $A = (T, \varphi, \alpha)$ be a k -VAS and $\mathcal{C}(A) = \langle T, Q, \delta, \alpha \rangle$ be its covering automaton. Let (q, u) be a loop, and let $\mathcal{S} = (x_0, q_1, u_1, x_1, q_2, \dots, x_{p-1}, q_p, u_p, x_p, q)$ be an iterating system of length p related to (q, u) . We note $C1(\mathcal{S}, (q, u))$ the condition: the iterating system \mathcal{S} can be transformed into an elementary minimal iterating system of length at most 1, by operations of decomposition or reduction.

Corollary 4.6. Let $A = (T, \varphi, \alpha)$ be a k -VAS and $\mathcal{C}(A) = \langle T, Q, \delta, \alpha \rangle$ be its covering automaton. If $L(A)$ is context-free, then the following condition holds:

- (P1') For every iterating system $\mathcal{S} = (x_0, q_1, u_1, x_1, q_2, \dots, x_{p-1}, q_p, u_p, x_p, q)$ related to an elementary loop (q, u) , $C1(\mathcal{S}, (q, u))$ holds.

Definition 4.8. Let $\mathbf{a}_1, \mathbf{a}_2, \dots, \mathbf{a}_t$ be t -tuples of \mathbb{Z}^k . We denote by $C3(\mathbf{a}_1, \mathbf{a}_2, \dots, \mathbf{a}_t)$ the condition: there exists a coordinate p_1 which is a dominating coordinate with respect to $\{\mathbf{a}_1, \mathbf{a}_2, \dots, \mathbf{a}_t\}$, and by $C3(\mathbf{a}_1, \mathbf{a}_2, \dots, \mathbf{a}_t, \mathbf{q})$ the condition: the coordinate p dominates the coordinate q with respect to $\{\mathbf{a}_1, \mathbf{a}_2, \dots, \mathbf{a}_t\}$.

The language of traces of a VAS is context-free if and only if it has a context-free intersection with every bounded regular language

Definition 3.1. We note $C2((q, u), (q', u'), (q, v), (q', v'))$ the condition: (q, u) and (q', u') are two loops in ϵ^- and (q, v) and (q', v') are two loops in ϵ^+ , such that there exist x_0, x_1, x_2 and x_3 with $\delta(x_0, x_1) = p, \delta(x_1, x_2) = v, \delta(x_2, x_3) = u$ and $\delta(x_3, x_0) = q$ and such that $\{v\}^- \subseteq w^+$ and $\{v'\}^- \subseteq (w')^+$, and such that either $\{v\}^-$ is not included in $\{w\}^+$, or $\{v'\}^-$ is not included in $\{w'\}^+$ for both.

We can state our second necessary condition:

Proposition 2.2. Let $A = (T, \varphi, \alpha)$ be a k -VAS and $\mathcal{C}(A) = \langle T, Q, \delta, \alpha \rangle$ be its covering automaton such that (P1) holds. If $L(A)$ is context-free, then the following condition holds:

- (P2) For no $(q, v), (q', v')$ in ϵ^- , $(p, u), (p', u')$ in ϵ^+ , $C2((p, u), (p', u'), (q, v), (q', v'))$ holds.

Definition 4.1. For any set W of k -tuples, denote J_w the set: $A_w = \{x \in H \mid \exists r, s \in \mathcal{V}, \text{ and } x_r \text{ and } x_s \text{ are not colinear and } x \in K_r \cap K_s\}$. We note $C4(W)$, the condition: the set A_w is a stratified set.

Proposition 4.5. Let $A = (T, \varphi, \alpha)$ be a k -VAS and $\mathcal{C}(A) = \langle T, Q, \delta, \alpha \rangle$ be its covering automaton such that (P1), (P2), (P3) and (P4) hold. If $L(A)$ is context-free, then the following condition holds:

- (P5) For all $j \in [1, m]$, if $W_{I^*(j)}$ has a dominating coordinate, then there is one in $ZERO(j)$.

- (P2) For no $(q, v), (q', v')$ in ε^- , $(p, u), (p', u')$ in ε^+ $\mathbb{C}2((p, u), (p', u'), (q, v), (q', v'))$ is satisfied.
- (P3) For all classes $[i]$ of states $\mathbb{C}3(\text{label}(\mathcal{W}_i))$ and $\mathbb{C}3(\text{label}(\mathcal{X}_i))$ are satisfied.
- (P4) For all $j \in [1, m]$, the set $W = W_{t^*(j)}$ satisfies $\mathbb{C}4(W)$.
- (P5) For all $j \in [1, m]$, if $W_{t^*(j)}$ has a dominating coordinate, then there is one in $ZERO(j)$.

The language of traces of a VAS is context-free if and only if it has a context-free intersection with every bounded regular language
